## CROWDED CONDITIONS GIVE

Austin, Texas, May 22 -In the last stallment of his report on tuberciscis in the Southwest, Dr. Ernest A. Sweet, the surgeon of the United States public health service, assigned to study this subject, calls atten, tion to the fact that the death rate among the Mexican population is even higher than among the negroes Dr. Sweet found that the death rate during a period of 10 years and based of San Apticio of 1910 pu lation of San Ancinio or 1910 was 609.7 per 100.000 living, and that he death rate at Ei Paso was 554.5 per 100,000 living. He attributes this high death rate, primarily, to bad housing conditions, although he states that some physicians in the Souawest attribute this enormous rate to infection derived from heaith seekers. Dr. Sweet admits that if conclusions relating to indigenous tuberculosis will require modification. In his opinion there is no connection between the com ing of tuberchasis invailas to the Southwest and the greatly increased prevaience of the disase among the Mexicans, allhough, strange to say they were practically synchronous He says, whoever is familiar with the situalion can not but be impressed with the fearful toll which disease exacts from these primitive people, and their utter helpiessaess belore the onsiaught of this infection. Living as they do in a region which is inimical to the development of this scourge, where climatic condions are conducive to sanitary living, and where there is little excuse for improper housing. the spectacle is all the more striking"
Dr. Sweet calls attention to the fact that there are two elements of
the Mexican population. The first the Mexican population. The first
are decendants of the early Spanish are decendants of the early Spanish
settlers, and they are not as prone settlers, and they are not as prone
to tuberculosis as are the other and to tuberculosis as are the other and larger element which are of the peon class, with a large and recent admixture of indian blood and a standard of Iiving exuemely low. Thirty years ago tuberculosis was an uncommon disease among the Mexican population, and it has been found that it is now very prevalent in Old Mexico. In support of his theory that the presence of consumptive strangers has nothing to do with the infection of the Mexican population Dr. Sweet calls attention to the fact that all primitive people have a very low resistance to the disease and that it has been found to be very prevalent in houses which have not been in very close contact with white people.
Recoveries of Mexican consumptives are exceedingly rare and if one member of the family become infected, it results generally in the entire family succumbing to the disease.
Dr. Sweet calls special attention to the "frighfful housing conditions which prevail, and these are sufficient in themselves to fully explain the high death rate recorded." He describes the adobe house and the frame structure or shack generally occupied oy ter mexican people.
He is particularly strong in his de-
nunciation of the corrals as he
found them in San Antonio. He found them in San Antonio. He refers to one in particular wien . In
cupied ground $150 \times 465$ feet. In this corral, he found 88 families with a total of 336 people. He calls attention to the fact that these being only one-story structures, the congestion is apparent, it being even greater than that of most city tenegreater

## CRALR SORGRUMS ARD CORN.

Mr. A. H. Leidigh of the Texas Experiment Station, College Station, Texas, offers the following suggestions to members of the Boys' Agricultural Clubs in regard to spring and summer cultivation of corn and the grain sorghums:
The intertillage or surface cultivation of summer crops is a thing on which all top-notch farmers put a great deal of importance. The hishest type of surface cultivation incidentally a result of the work done and is not the entire aim of the work, nor is weed-killing the only reason for the clean, thorough tillage of cultivated crops. More depends on thorough and constant cultivation than on almost any ther step in the profitable produc difference between grain sor the and Indian corn is very sorghum matter what our grain sorshum or corn crop is intended for, we desire he greatest possible profit or re turn from this crop
Throughout the widely spread parts of Texas it is customary to plant corn and grain sorghums in many different ways. In the eastem part of the state corn is planted on a small ridge: in the western part of the state crops are planted in a furrow. The grain sorghums rarely make a big crop in east Texas while corn is pretty sure to fail in the extreme west. The conditions that caise sake neccessary different tom ifferent kinds of work and yet the lant iteelf to mate a bis yer the where, has to have certain cony tions for its avowh cond eeds lifh growh. The plan mount of moisture in the soil and lood in the soil which will be carried o the plant in this moisture. Cu nously enough, the soil must contain air. Now a baked, crusted soi dries out rapidly and has no air circulation. You see from this that a Ix and needs to be in a reaily bad there is not a be cullivated even also a fact that weed in it. It is in the soil will keep out air and decrease the amount of food, while too little moisture will injure the plant in almost the same way
I assume that already this year you have applied fertilizers to your crop and that the crop is up; also that you have a thick stand of plants. As the young plants are coming through the ground it is a sood plan to harrow the field; this barrowing which should scratch the arface to a depth of about one inch will injure a few plants, kill a lot of weeds, break up the surface crust, and make the plants grow. Harrowing stops the evaporating of moisture by putting a mulch on the soil and letting air into the soil. Of course if you plant with a lister in furrow, you cannot harrow the bottom of the furrow. On listed tround, if the soil is baked, you tes in the bottom of the fir oper mife cultivator or a diek cultiv,
You are raising your crop to get he bidgest yield of anybody in the trate, so after you give the ground its first general working over, you hed better use the hoe. The entire boe around cach stalk and also cut
out all large weeds; this will make the first cultivation easier. After ooeing, start the cultivator. Any ood farmer can cuilivate corn tha 3 or 4 inches high and as soon as you have cultivated, begin the work fit

Every person in the United States on years old or over may open an ccount in a postal savings bank fter July 1, according to an instrukve leaflet on the postal savings stem just issued. This important xtension of the service will be ade possible by permitting persons ving in communities so sparsely ion as not to justry de designaegular postal savings banks to pen accounts by mail.Under the plan adopted by the postmaster general for opening acounts by mail an intending deposor, residing where there is no reglarly designated postal savings ank, will apply to his local postnaster who will see that necessary dentification data is prepared and forwarded to a nearby postoffice authorized to accept deposits. The intending depositor will then be tiven permission to forward his first and subsequent deposits by noney order or registered mail diect to the postmaster at the bankag point for which receipts or cerlicates will be issued. He may withdraw all or any part of his posal savings by mail and on demand ogether with any interest that may due him.
The new leaflet points out that any person ten years old or over may open an account in his or her own name; that an account may be opened by a married woman free from any control or interference by her husband; that post office officials are forbidden to disclose to any peron, except the depositor, the Irawal of any deposits; that withdrawals may be made without pre ous notice, and that the govern psits guarantees to repay all de terest.

## Health of Workers in Infested

Regiona
Field workers of the Bureau of Entomology of the department, who have been carrying on investigations in regard to malarial mosquitoes, have now spent two seasons in the
region where malaria is widely prevalent without a single case of the disease having developed in any member of the party. The nature of their work subjects these men to daily contact with the poisonous mosquitoes and it may safely be more risk of infection than the average visitor to infested sections. For this reason the precautions that they have adopted so successfully against infection should be of interest to all whose affairs carry them into malarious regions.
Malaria is more prevalent in some sections of the United States
than in others, but it may occur wherever collections of surface water exist during hot weather, except at high elevations.
It has now been scientifically demonstrated, of course, that malaria is conveyed by certain of the Anopheles mosquitoes, that these mosquitoes are active chiefly at night, and that the problem of avoid ing malaria thus consists principally
in protecting one's self from mosquito bites after dark.
