ItXANS NOST PAY FOI
NEZDLESS PRIIMRTS
By reason of the requirements of law Texas will have four primary elections in 1916, which elections will cost approximately $\$ 325,000$ Of this sum $\$ 100,000$ is to be paid out of county treasuries for the holding of the democratic presiden tial primary. Other parties are privileged to hold such primaries but if they do so they must take care of the expenses.
All parties are required to nominate candidates for the Uniter States senate through a primary election. Each must take care of the expenses of its own election If the minority parties have nominees for the United States senate they must incur an enormous expense not heretofore imposed upon hem
It is doubtful that money can be aised to pay the expenses of the ruasir senatorial primary election, ecause the law does not auchoriz anybody to contribute money for uch purpose, and the total autho rized expenses which may be incurred by or for each of the tw candidates to be voted upon in the second senatorial primary are limited to $\$ 1,000$. This, in brief, is the aituation brought about by the so called progressive election laws en acted in 1913 by the thirty-third egislature.
Recently, in a communication to he News, W. T. Parker, chairman of the democratic executive com nittee of Navarro County, pointed out the fact that the second primary for the nomination of a candilate for United States senator was et by law for a difierent date than the optional second primary for the nomination of candidates for county ffices. He declared, therefore, tha here would be three primary elec tions in Texas in 1916, and tha here was no way under the law to pay the expenses of the second primary. He explained that county candidates bear the bulk of the ex penses of a general election; that there will be no such candidates in the second senatorial primary, and hat, as the expenses of the candidates for senator are limited nar rowly, these candidates can not foot the bill for said primary election. Mr. Parker estimated the expenses o primary election at $\$ 750,000$ ad for the reasons given predicted hat not more than 10 per cent of he qualified democratic voters vould participate in the second primary election.
In commenting upon Mr. Parker' etter the News drew attention to he fact that the laws of the state call for four primary elections, not hree, in Texas next year, Mr. Parker having overlooked that. the democratic party now is required to hold a primary election to express preferences for presidential candidates, to choose delegates to ominate candidates for elector Wherefore the prospect for political peace is poor.
