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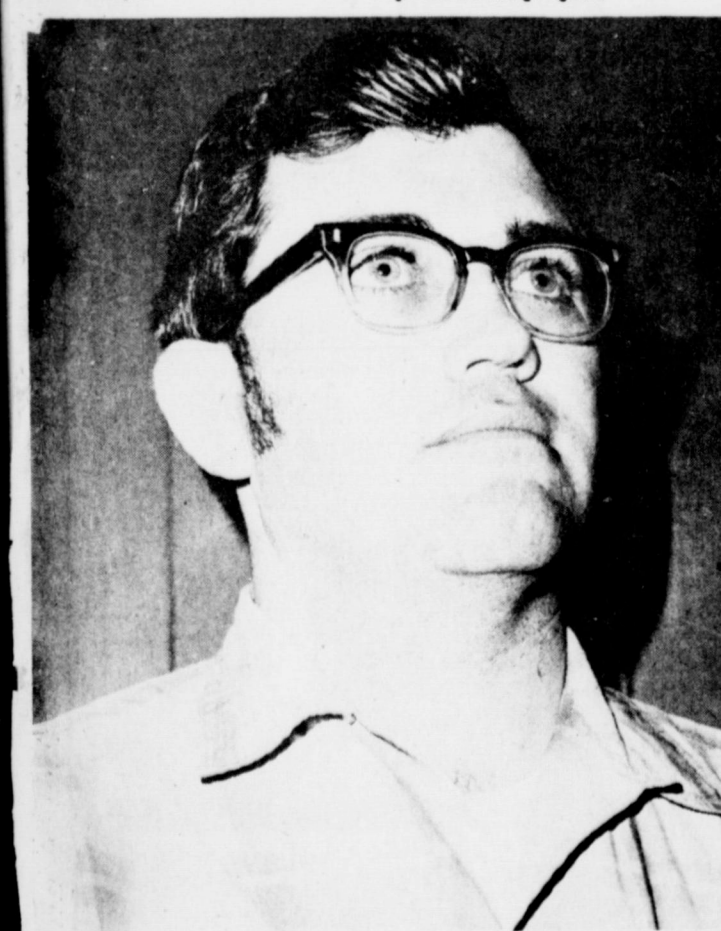

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Rainfall Reports Vary From .10 To 2 Inches

General rains fell over Bailey County over the weekend and into the week this week. Varied reports Saturday showed from two and a half inches near Bula to just a trace near Lubbock.

In the Bula area, two and a half inches to two inches reports were heard on Saturday. Evidently the rain fell in a narrow strip as Mrs. J.W. Layton reported to the Journal that they received two inches three miles east and one and a fourth miles south of Enochs while south of Enochs only .2 of an inch was reported and then towards Bula, reports up to two and a half inches were reported.

Muleshoe reported rain Sunday afternoon as a moderate shower passed over late that afternoon. Other portions of the county did not report any rain on Sunday.

Early Tuesday morning, Muleshoe received another small shower between 6:30 and 7:30 a.m.

Mrs. Harold Mardis, 10 miles northwest of Muleshoe on the West Camp road, reporting only .10 of an inch over the weekend and a shower Tuesday morning.

Mrs. J.W. Crume, 15 miles north of Muleshoe, reported that they had only received a trace, not even enough to measure, over the last few days.

Mrs. Edward Crume, one mile south and a mile west of Bu-

la, reported that they received over two and a half inches of rain Saturday night alone.

The rains received in the south part of the county were very beneficial to the dry land farming in that area.

North of town, very little moisture has been reported over the past few days. J.H. Clay at Clay's Corner reported that they have not received over .10 of an inch of moisture since last week.

Evidently the almost daily showers that have been roaming around Bailey County have been very spotted. All moisture, no matter how little was appreciated this week as it fell on newly planted soil in the county area.

Ed Cox reported that he would try to get six individuals from each civic club in town to help secure funds for the Fourth of July Celebration.

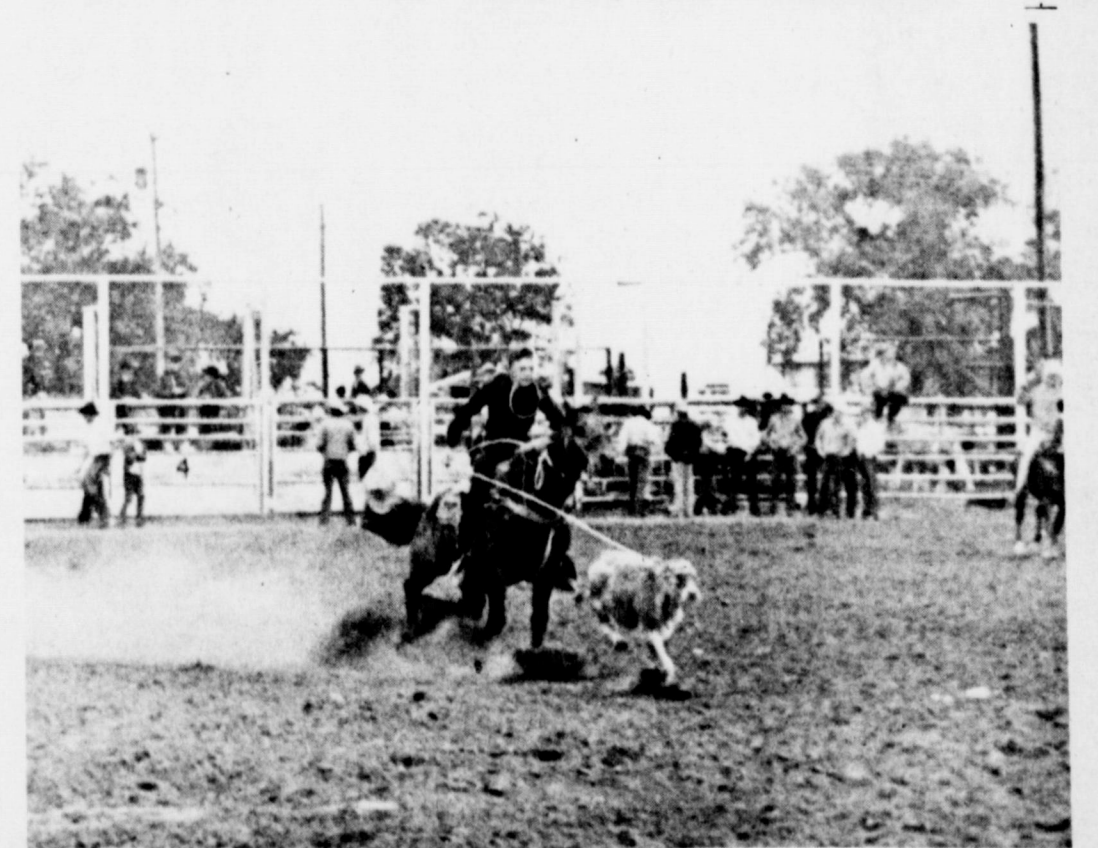

The Texas High Plains is well on its way to planting what is expected to be the highest acreage seeded to cotton in the last 20 years.
 According to Donald Johnson, executive Vice President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., which covers 25 Plains counties, estimates of total acres planted to cotton for 1973 run from a minimum of 2.7 million to as high as 3 million, "and planting is expected to reach the 90 percent completion mark during the week of May 20."
 In 1952 the area put a whopping 3.9 million acres in cotton. The next highest acreage was seen last year when an estimated 2.6 million acres were planted. The huge acreage of 1952 resulted in a harvest of only a little over 1.5 million bales, and the production record for the Plains was set in 1961 with 2,443,900 bales gathered from 2,593,440 planted acres.
 "So 1973 acreage is almost a cinch to be above any crop since 1952," Johnson figures, "and with our good underground moisture and a little bit of luck there is reason to speculate on setting a new all-time production record for the Plains."
 Across the cotton belt, the cotton acreage and production picture is no so rosy. According to the most recent report on acreage intentions compiled by the National Cotton Council after a survey of state extension service and USDA personnel, only Texas, Oklahoma, California, Arizona and North Carolina are expected to equal or exceed last year's plantings.
 Cotton prospects, both for acreage and production, are still uncertain in the rain and flood plagued states of Mississippi, Arkansas, Missouri, Louisiana and Tennessee -- states which in 1972 accounted for 4.8 million of the nation's 13.99 million acres and produced almost 38 percent of the total crop.
 Acreage in the five states for 1973, according to the NCC report, is now not expected to be above 3.5 million and could be down to 3.3 million, even with continued good weather. Another 175,000 acres or so will be dropped by the Carolinas, Georgia, Alabama and New Mexico.
 Nationwide the figures from NCC's survey indicate 1973 plantings may be from 12,388,000 to 13,070,000 acres,

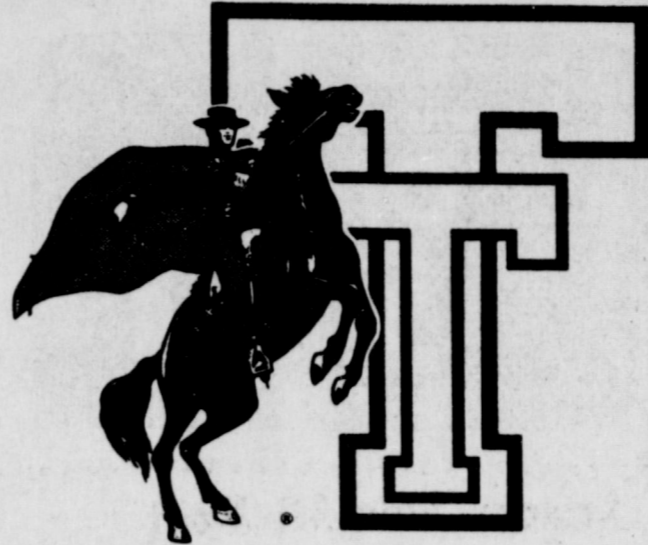

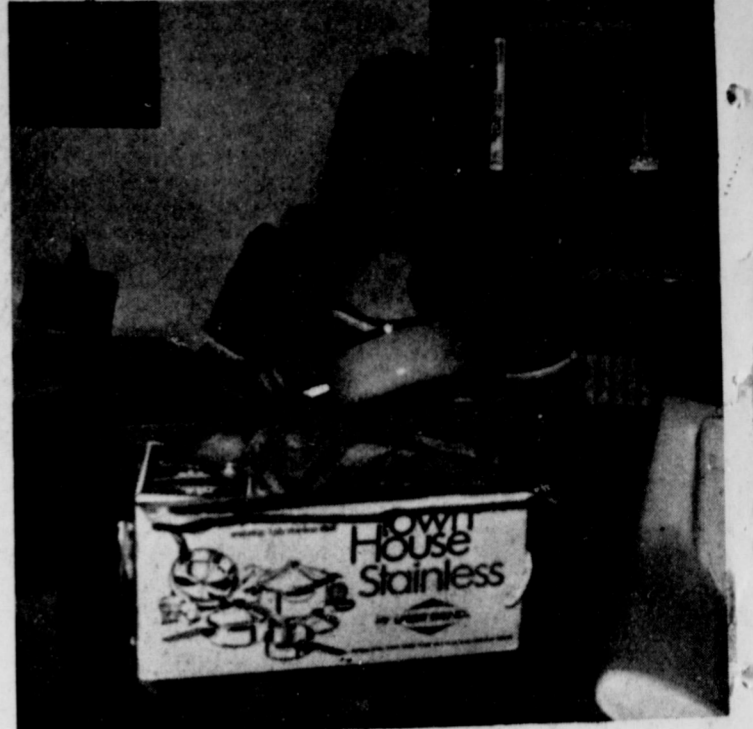

ESA Cyclists Named Honorary Citizens

The four cyclists of ESA's Million Dollar Bike Ride were named Honorary Citizens of Muleshoe Sunday by Corky Green, President of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, and by R.A. Bradley, immediate past president of the Chamber.

"We're riding for the lives of children," said Bea Leon, 24-year-old mother, professional woman, and cycle enthusiast had this explanation for her role in a transcontinental bicycle event that is raising money to fight catastrophic childhood diseases.

"Our goal is to help raise \$1 million for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital of Memphis," the attractive young Phoenix woman said here Sunday as members of the ESA Million Dollar Bike Ride cross-country team pedaled through en route to Philadelphia.

Mrs. Leon is one of three young women taking part in coast-to-coast cycle marathon being sponsored by Epsilon Sigma Alpha, women's international service organization. The cyclists left Beverly Hills, Calif., on May 7 with

a send-off by entertainer Danny Thomas, who founded the unique research hospital.

By the time they reach Philadelphia, they will have traveled more than 4,800 miles through 15 states on gold-plated cycles provided by Lambert, Inc., of England. Riding in shifts, the riders average about 150 miles per day.

Joining Mrs. Leon on the ride is Anne Webster, a 23-year-old University of Colorado student from Santa Barbara, Calif., and Carol Clark, 24, Denver resident who plans a career as a veterinarian.

Ruben Leon, Eea's husband, is team captain and a veteran of the 1972 ESA cross-country ride. He said the cross-country trip is just one element of a nationwide cycling event being sponsored by ESA. In all, the ESA Million Dollar Bike Ride will involve thousands of riders who will cumulatively pedal more than one million miles in local charity events planned in ESA chapter cities throughout the U.S.

A second team of national riders also is crossing the country over a northern route. St. Jude Children's Hospital

is the only institution of its kind devoted solely to basic and clinical research of catastrophic childhood diseases. Since its opening 11 years ago, the hospital has treated more than 3,500 young patients free of charge. Medical protocols for treatment of childhood diseases developed at St. Jude now are used widely by hospitals throughout the world, and St. Jude researchers have re-written the medical text books on acute lymphocytic leukemia, a disease that was considered incurable when the hospital began its "total therapy" program in 1962. Children suffering with this disease today have a 50-50 chance for survival, hospital officials say.

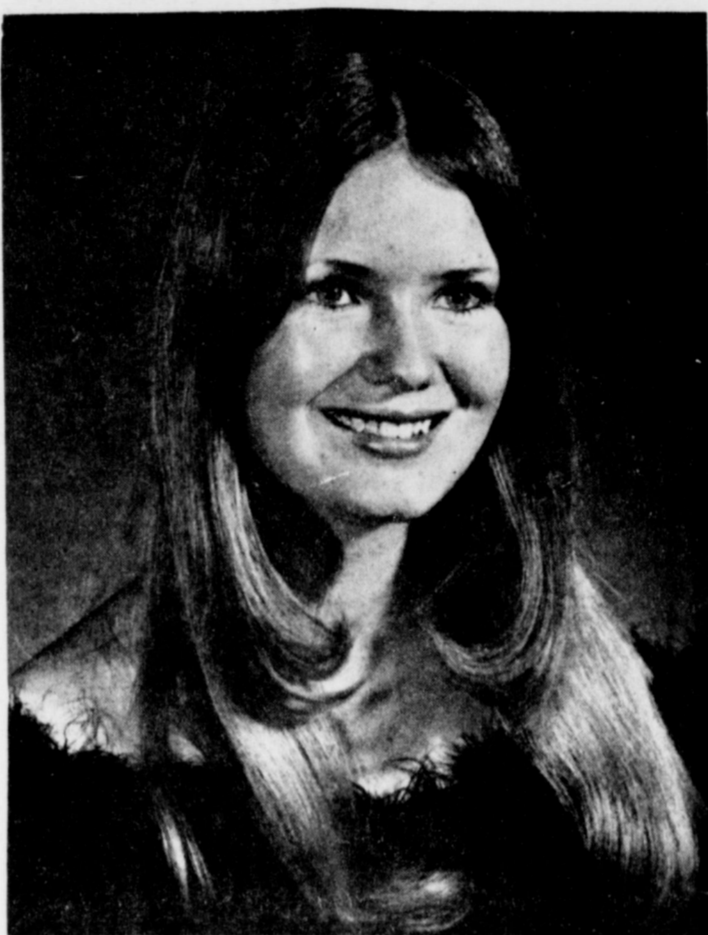

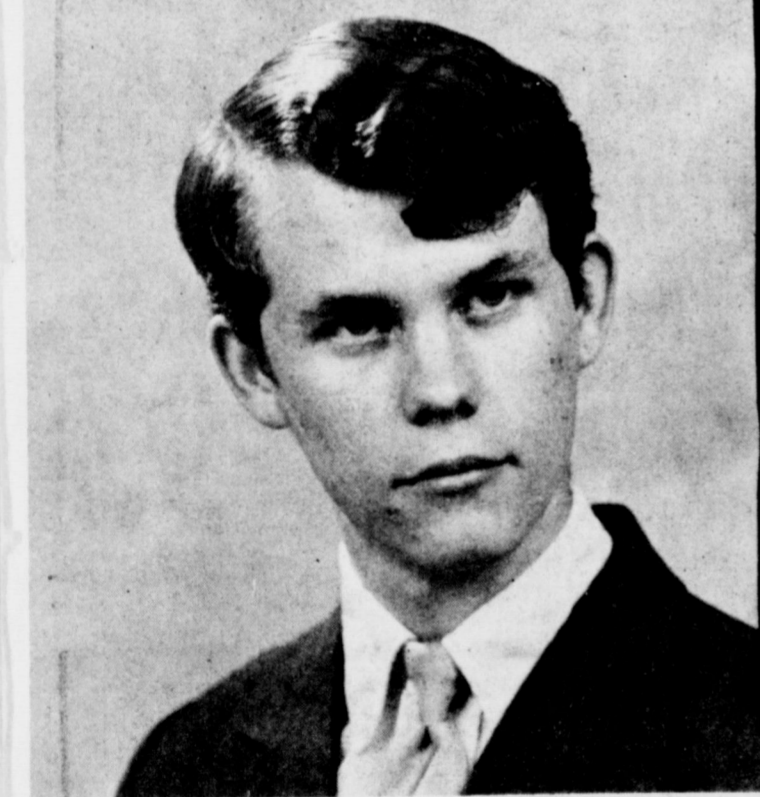

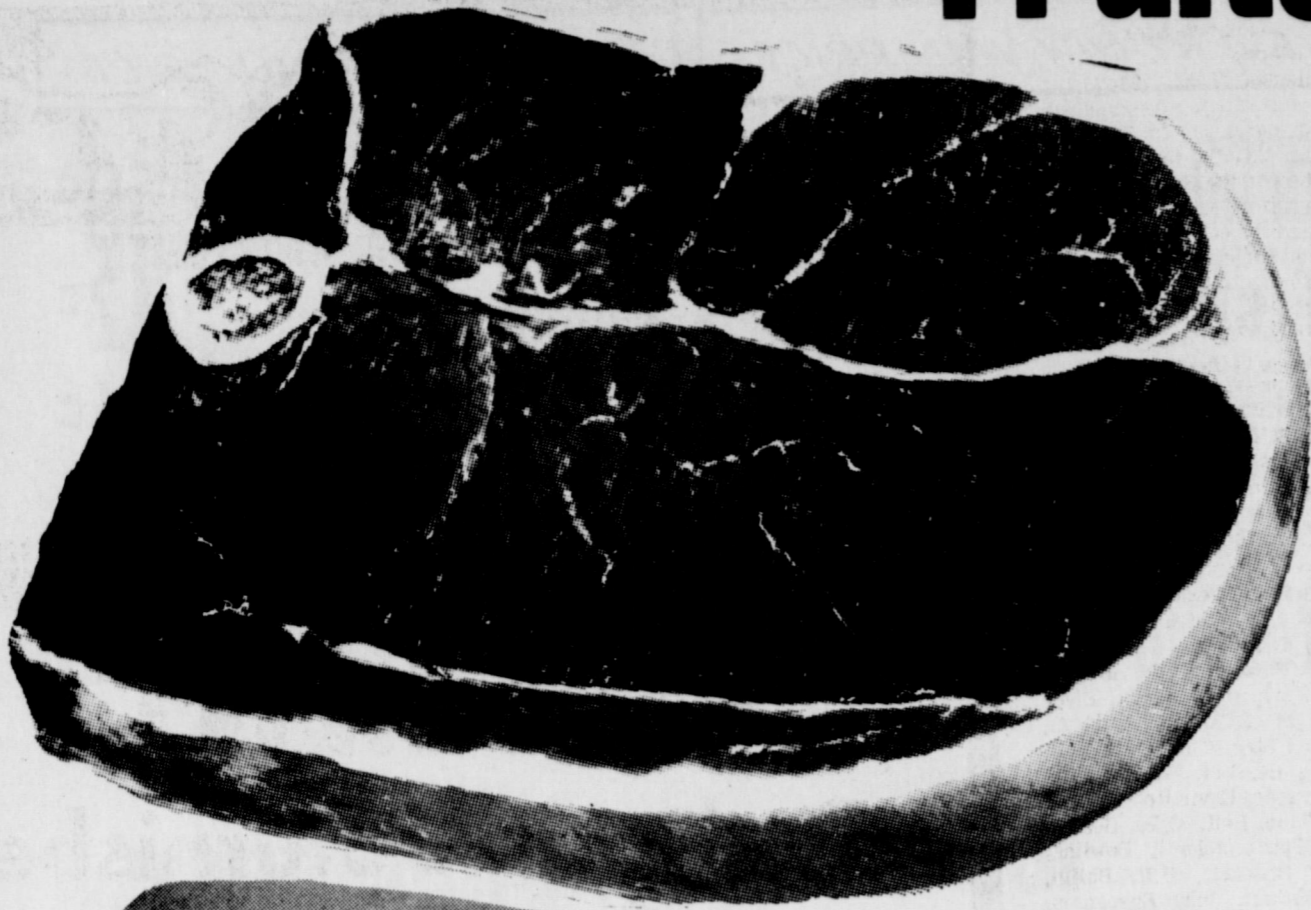
