They were in good spirits, although sweltering from the heat, and looked very much like a bunch of our own boys going to play baseball. They were travelling in mili tary style with officers and guards tary style with officers and guards
on duty. Some of the men threw off letters to be mailed here and many of these letters were addressed to Troy, N. Y.
The first train carried over six hundred soldiers and about eighteen sleeping cars, besides other cars for the equipment. Twelve similar trains were delivered at Longview Thursday morning.
