Sitting as Juror
Austin. Tex., September 18, 1917. Editor Crockett Courier:
I have received several letters and petitions from my constituents advising me what the sentiment of the people is in my district in regard to the impeachment trial now in progress. I am sitting as a juror in this case and, in my opinion, 1 should be guided in reaching a verdict only by the law and evidence. Suppose you were on a jury in your county trying a case, would you render a verdict on what your neighbors thought about it, or would you be guided by the law and evidence?
We may reach a verdict before this is printed, but I desire to take this occasion to express to my friends how I feel about this trial.
