As stated last week, a new board of directors was chosen at the annual meeting held on February 27 with one exception and a member of the board.

The new board met Monday, elected officers and outlined some new features for the coming year. The following officers were elected: W. G. Cartwright, president; A. M. Decuir, vice president; W. P. Bishop, treas- who is not now a member has urer, and H. A. Fisher, secretary.

A membership committee was appointed by the president from among those present, and a lengthy discussion was had as to methods to be employed to increase the monthly dues so that the club would be able to assist materially in a financial way any worthy public projects that should be presented during the year. In the past the revenues have only been sufficient to defray running expenses, and in the judgment of the new board the time has arrived when some working capital should be available. It was stated that the two years the club had been engaged in the co-operative campaign had demonstrated that the policy was the correct one and that enough had been accomplished to warrant the belief that the most satisfactory results could be attained if the work was persistently followed up and properly financed. One of the principal objects that needs some money to put in motion is the publishing of a descriptive booklet of Crockett and Houston county for general distribution, for the purpose of letting the world know what a glorious country we have and how little it costs to buy a farm in this section of the greatest and richest agricultural state in the union. These booklets should be furnished every merchant and professional man in town with a view of having one enclosed in every letter that is sent outside of Houston county. Then some advertising should be done in northern and eastern papers to the effect that one of these interesting booklets would be mailed on application. The printing of the pamphlets and the advertising might cost a couple of hundred dollars and could easily result in bringing fifty to a hundred new farm-home settlers, and these in turn would bring many more. It should be borne in mind that no effort has been made to bring in new people since we began this co-operative and diversified campaign that has put an entirely new face on the landscape and many thousands of new dollars in the pockets of our farmers. Just take a trip out any of the fourteen roads radiating from Crockett and make a note of the improvements that have been made and are now being finished on practically every farm you see. New houses in abundance and some of them costing several thousand dollars; barns costing from five hundred to fifteen hundred dollars; new roofs on old buildings everywhere you look, and new garden fences enclosing much larger tracts than ever before, showing conclusively that our nation's call for more feed and food stuffs is being generally heeded. 

Fall Into Trap Prepared by Young Captain, Who Is Killed in Encounter.

CROCKETT, TEXAS

With the American Army in France, March 1.-American troops repulsed a strong German attack this morning in the salient north of Toul. There were many American casualties, one

of the killed being a captain who was graduated from West Point in 1917.

American hands. The ground in front of the trenches was strewn with German dead.

A, driving wet snow was falling this morning when the Germans opened fire on the American salient with every weapon at their command. Seventy-sevens, heavy shells and gas shells fell in a perfect whirlwind on the American trenches for half an hour. At the same time other enemy

At 6 o'clock the barrage fire lifted on the trenches to the right of the salient and Germans numbering 240 came sweeping forward under the protection of their fire. 

THIRD LIBERTY LOAN IS TO OPEN APRIL 6

Amount, Rate of Interest and Other Features to be Announced Later.

Washington, March 1.-On April 6, the first anniversary of the United States' entry into the war, the third liberty loan will open. There will be campaign of three or four weeks.

In announcing the date tonight Secretary McAdoo said the amount of the loan, the interest rate and other features such as convertibility of bonds of previous issue, maturity and terms of payment are yet to be determined and that new legislation will be necessary before plans can be completed.

The fact that the amount of the loan is dependent on further legislation indicates that it will be for more than \$3,600,000,000, the remainder of authorized but unissued bonds, and the fact that certificates of indebtedness now being sold in anticipation of the loan bear 4 1-2 per cent affords some indication of the interest rate.





Wheat Saving Plan to Be Rigidly Enforced.

The food administration has wired its administrators to strictly enforce the rule which requires bakers to use 20 per cent of wheat flour substitutes in all bread and rolls baked by them beginning February 24. This rule is an important link in the administration's wheat conservation plan, upon the success of which depends the ability to supply the allies with wheat flour.

The list of substitutes that may be used is very wide, and includes bran, shorts, middlings, corn flour, corn meal, edible corn starch, hominy, barley, grits, rolled oats, oatmeal, rice, rice flour, buckwheat flour, potato flour, milo flour, milo meal, kaffir flour, kaffir meal, feterita flour, feterita meal, soya meal, soya bean meal, peanut meal, cassava flour, taro flour, banana flour and other products of a similar nature.

Bread made of graham flour, or socalled whole wheat flour, which contains 20 per cent or more of bran, shorts or middlings, complies with this rule.



Wheatless Weeks May Be Necessary.

Washington, Feb. 18 .--- Wheatless weeks instead of wheatless days are imminent unless pro duction is increased, the senate agriculture committee was told Monday by C. H. Hyde, representing the Oklahoma State Council of Defense, who said that price fixing by the food administrator should be extended

to wheat substitutes. Meatless and wheatless days have tended to decrease production in Oklahoma, the reduction in the consumption having cre-ated a surplus, he said. Hyde suggested that authority to fix prices be increased by per-

mitting price fixing on all commodities or curtailing the food administration's authority to stipulate the price of wheat and other food commodities.

The Berlin explanation of the vance of the German troops in Russia is that it is meant to make sure that Trotzky will do what he now says he is ready to do, which is, sign the peace of German dictation. That may be the purpose of the advance; Trotzky has shown that his promises have to be put under the bond of compulsion if one is to have much faith in them. But this is not the only plausible explanation that the circumstances would suggest. Another and better one is that this advance of the German armies is only meant to strengthen Germany's military grip on the Russian territories to which it made claim at Brest-Litovsk. In that case, there will be no attempt to go to Petrograd. Another possible explanation is that Germany is expanding its Russian conquests under the im-
