## SOLDIERS GIVE LIVES,

OTHERS LEND FUNDS
Secretary McAdoo Points Out Reason for Liberty Loan at Houston.
Houston, Tex., April 15.-"We pay our soldiers $\$ 30$ a month while in the United States and $\$ 33$ a month after they reach France to give their life if necessary for freedom and democracy. They have no striking privileges and have no idea of striking unless it is the kaiser. You are only asked to put your savings in liberty bonds and war savings stamps. What chance are you taking in comparison to that of the soldiers?"

## NOTHER CALL MADE

FOR PRESENT DRAFT
Nearly Fifty Thousand Men Be Mobilized From May 1 For Ten Days.
Washington, April 14.-An ther draft call for 49,843 regis rants has been sent to gover nors of states by Provost Mar shal General Crowder. Mobilization of the men is ordered for May 1 and 10, the war depart ment announced tonight, and they will be sent to eleven forts and recruiting barracks, probably for training with regular army units there.
The call increases to more than 300,000 the number of select men ordered to camp since xcess of the monthly averag that would have been mobilized under the original plan to call 800,000 men this year over nine months' period. Future months period. Futur omplete the program would midsummer.
Under President Wilson's de ermination to hasten the dis patch of American troops to rance to reinforce the British and French armies, the whole program of the army is speeded Fu
Further announcements are expected to follow the return of Secretary Baker from his visit to the battle fronts and confer ences with officials of Grea Britain, France and Italy. Troops now are moving to Europe at rapid rate and this clearing of training camps will permit the calling of men much faster than was contemplated before the German offensive made it im tle fronts.

AT CROCKETT
Emphatically declaring that there is no law to prevent him from again taking the office of governor of Texas and legally position, Former Governor James E . Ferguson of Temple James E. Ferguson of Temple at 2 o'cloek Saturday afternoon which marked the second speech which marked the second speech
of his campaign for re-election of his campaign for re-election as the chief executive of the
state, from which place he had been removed by impeachment proceedings. The speech was delivered from the bandstand in the court house yard, the audience finding standing room on the easf, and north sides of the court house. His audience was estimated by a Ferguson supporter at 750.
The former governor was introduced by Mayor J. H. Painter. Arriving on the 11 o'clock train from Palestine, he was met at the station by a reception committee and escorted to the hotel speaking followed at 2 o'clock The former governor paid his respects to the legislature that impeached him, referring to the impeachment committee as the "smelling committee." In his speech here and elsewhere he re fers to his opponent as Willie Hobby." He paid his respects to the "university bunch" in ex plaining the institution of
impeachment proceedings.
In his speech the former gov ernor presented two principa contentions. The first of these was, as has been stated, that he is qualified under the law to hold the office to which he aspires. The second was that all his political troubles, including and end ing with his impeachment "by a kangaroo, senate," were due to his efforts to see that the chil
dren of poor parents were given an opportunity to acquire a common school education equal to that given to others to acquire "higher education"

More Destroyers Being Built Than Were in All Allied Navies When War Began.

Chicago, April 10.-Since April 6,1917 , the day on which war was declared against Germany,
there have been added to the there have been added to the
United States navy 1275 vessels United States navy 127 vessels retary of the Navy Daniels declared Wednesday night in an
address at the National Chamber of Commerce.
"In addition to the battle cruisers, dreadnaughts and scout cruisers authorized, some build-
ing and others deferred temporarily for the more pressing construction of ships to transport soldiers and munitions and supplies, he said, we are now known as smaller craft, from 65 with an aggregate tonnage with an aggr
420,217 tons.
We are now working day and vate plants on the construction of more destroyers than were in all the allied navies when war began, and every possible facil-
ity is being created to construct additional fighting craft which can be effective against the submarine stiletto warfare of assassination and murder."
Mr. Daniels then turned to the efforts being made to increase the merchant marine, declaring
that the supreme need of the that the supreme need of the
hour is for ships to carry mil hour of soldiers to France. He pointed out that today there are 390 vessels under American control with a tonnage of $2,762,605$ and that in addition 471,000 tons
of Dutch ships would soon be put of Dutch ships would soon be put
into the service. into the service. After the Chamber of Com iels addressed a crowd estimated at 15,000 persons at the stock yards advocating purchases of Liberty loan bonds in which he declared:

As an additional Honor emblem, a blue star, to be sewn into the white field of the Flag, will be awarded to communities every time they increase their quotas by a hundred per cent. In other words, if a town's quota is $\$ 100,000$, it will be entitled to an Honor Flag when its subscriptions reach this amount, and $\$ 200,000$ it will be entitled to on $\epsilon$ blue star.
The raising of the Honor Flag in any community should be made the occasion of a great patriotic demonstration, and be made one of the greatest events in the life of the community.
In many communities there will be used, in connection with "Honor Roll."
