With the demand from Eng by the return to peace status of busi ness, and with more tonaage bein made available, the prospects for narketing the new crop coming on is lecidedly improved.
The Germans have quickly ratified the peace treaty, and as their countr was not devastated by war, they wi ufacturing. The German manufac curers should find a great market for cotton goods not only in the former German empire, but in neighboring countries as well. Even though the people are poverty stricken as result
of the war, the upper classes are of the war, the upper classes are deal, while the purchasing power of other classes will increase as they reurn to work.
Credit arrangements will have to be made but steps are already being taken in this direction by financial crop now assured, and the world markets about to open again, the cotton situation, from the growers' standpoint, is the best within the last five years.-Houston Post.
