

Fire chief seeks court's help with unnecessary fire runs fields.

Muleshoe Fire Chief Richard Ronek appeared before the Bailey County Commissioners' Court, during its regular session Monday, to request its help concerning unreported controlled burns in the rural

Ronek said there was an increasing problem with the fire department being

controlled burns in the county, and asked the court area surrounding Muleshoe. to consider passage of an ordinance that would require county residents to notify the Muleshoe Police

dispatched unnecessarily to Department prior to burning said Ronek, adding that on few occasions, the property owner who neglected to notify area emergency and law enforcement personnel of their intent to burn off a field have threatened the volunteer firefighters who had merely responded to a neighbor's report of a fire.

"We don't have to contact anyone," the fire chief said, referring to responses made by some property owners who were asked to let the fire department know if there was going to be a controlled burn.

"I'm asking you all, what's the solution?" Ronek asked. "It should be out of courtesy," said County

Judge Sherri Harrison. All of the court appeared to sympathize with the fire chief over the problem, but Commissioner Joey Kindle wasn't sure if there was both the hospital and the much the court could do about the problem, adding that the court had more authority in such matters if it placed the county under a burn ban, such as it did last year due to the state-wide wild fire problem.

Managing diabetes through nutrition

Diabetes is a fact of life for millions. According to figures from the American Diabetes Association, more than 17 million Americans are living with diabetes, and 16 million of them have type 2 (formerly known as adult onset diabetes).

Diabetes can cause health problems throughout the body, but those who have type 2 can do a lot about improving their own health by keeping a careful watch on

People with diabetes can live long, healthy lives if they take good care of themselves — particularly by controlling blood glucose levels through good nutrition.

People with diabetes don't have to follow complicated meal plans or eat special foods. All they need to do is eat healthfully, the same foods as everyone else in the family. The key is making better food choices.

First, add up the amount of fiber you eat every day fiber is found in fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and beans.

Then, carefully monitor intake of sugar, fat, and salt eat less each day. And be sure to choose foods from a wide selection each day.

If you adopt good eating habits and eat nutritionally balanced meals, you will be making a great start. Add to that all the other healthy habits — such as exercising regularly — and you will be on the road to staying healthy.

Food and nutrition play an important part in managing diabetes. For more information on food and nutrition for diabetes, plan to attend the Cooking Well with Diabetes program, in the dining room of Muleshoe Area Medical Center, on Oct. 2, 9, 16, and Nov.13, 2007, at 6:30 p.m.





"Free Flight: Rio de Janeiro to Miami, Florida."

I wasn't the only person to hear about the offer but one of the few to phone and request details. The courier service offered an airline ticket to anyone willing to carry a bag of mail to the States.

No company makes such offers anymore. But this was 1985-years before intense airport security. My dad was dying of ALS, and airline tickets were expensive. Free tickets? The offer sounded too good to be true.

So I walked away from it.

Many do the same with John 3:16. Millions read the verse. Only a handful trust it. Wary of a catch perhaps? Not needy enough maybe? Cautioned by guarded friends? I was. Other Rio residents saw the same offer. Some read it and smelled a rat. "Don't

risk it," one warned me. "Better to buy your own ticket." But I couldn't afford one. Each call home to Mom brought worse news. "The doctor says it's time to call hospice."

So I revisited the flyer. Desperation heightened my interest. Doesn't it always? When desperation typhoons into your world, God's offer of a free flight home demands a second look. John 3:16 morphs from a nice verse into a life vest.

Some of you are wearing it. You can recount the day you put it on. These words have kept you company through multiple windswept winters. I pray they warm you through the ones that remain.

Others of you are still studying the flyer. Still pondering the possibility, wrestling with the promise. One day wondering what kind of fool offer this is, the next wondering what kind of fool would turn it down.

I urge you not to. Don't walk away from this one. Who else can get you home? Take Jesus' offer. Get on board. You don't want to miss the chance to see your Father.

Thanks to the courier folks, I was present at my father's death. Thanks to God, he'll be present at yours. He cares too much not to be.

Believe in him and you

will . . . not . . .

perish.

You will have life, eternal life, forever.
