As I am desirous of being a delegate at large from the state of Indiana, I wish, in consonance with what I hope has been my entire public career, to state the substance of what I think the demo-

because it affected our internal affairs. All of the methods and measures adopted for the preservation of the peace of our country and the winning of the war met with my approval, and I am ready to defend them.



Freight rates have played a very small part in the rising cost of living.

Other causes - the waste of war, under-production, credit inflation - have added dollars to the cost of the necessities of life, while freight charges have added only cents.



To add brightness to the sun or glory to the name of Washington is alike impossible. Let none attempt it. In solemn awe pronounce the name and in its naked, deathless splendor leave it

The text of this unknown example of Lincoln's eloquence was found in Washington by Lucien High Alexander of Philadelphia, who gave it to the Associated Press today. An account of the ceremony at which Lincoln spoke was contained in the copy of the Sangamon Journal, published at Springfield Feb. 25, 1842. The tribute to Washington was the final paragraph of an address on another subject and the address in full was published in the Journal of March 25.



A PROLETARIAT PROCLAMATION

One-Day Walkout of Workmen in all Countries Urged to Show Strength.

Galveston, Texas, Feb. 21.-Activities of the Russian bolshevik, or communist party, is revealed in an order for a general one-day strike all over the world of members of the communist party sent to Galveston by Warren W. Peters, Young Men's Christian Association worker in charge of army and navy work in Vladivostok. The proclamation states that the Russian communists are not strong enough to combat the allied powers, but that a general strike for one day would show the organization of the proletariat. It will be noted that the strike was called for January 3.

The proclamation addressed "to the proletariat of all countries together," but more particularly to the "comrade workmen of Vladivostok," follows:

"The Far Eastern committee of the Russian communistic party hereby calls the workmen and employes of all shops, factories, business houses of the city and the railroads to make a one-day strike as protest against the execution of your comrades by order of General Rozanoff, and against the intervention of the allies.

"Bankrupt governments, the bourgeoisie and militarists continue their evil courses, ever taking out fresh victims from the lines of the revolutionary proletariat.

Tramples Down Populace.

"Having no strength to stand against the red soviet army, and not being in force to stand against partisan developments, this government successfully tramples down the helpless prisoners (the population of Vadivostok,) being under the protection of the Japanese and American bayonet. "We are protesting against the armed intervention of Japan and the United States, which prevents any attempt on the part of the majority of the population of our countryworkmen and peasants-from organizing any real government, and is only an obstacle to the installation in power of the soviet government. "In taking part in this one-day strike, comrade workmen, you must understand that such a strike is not an act of war against our enemies; it is just a census of our force-a demonstration of our discipline and good organization. "The most important act of war was, and will be only an armed revolution, and as at the present time, because of the intervention and presence of the allied troops, who are ready to stop any revolutionary movement, the armed revolution is of no use. It is premature. From time to time by organizing peaceful demonstrations the proletariat must show to their enemies that they are always ready, that they observe closely the civil war on the part of the red and black international workmen, and are ready at any moment to put all their forces in this war.





Vice President Would be Delegate From Indiana to San Francisco Convention.

Washington, Feb. 15.-Vice Presi dent Marshall, in a letter to E. G. Hoffman of Fort Wayne, Ind., secretary of the democratic national committee, made public tonight, announced his candidacy as a delegate at large from Indiana to the coming San Francisco convention upon an "oldtime, democratic platform."

In view of political gossip that Vice President Marshall is slated to become chairman of the democratic platform committee, his letter was read with that the states discharge the duties especial interest by officials here.

"Another presidential campaign impends," Mr. Marshall wrote. "Thus far, the president, who is the chief of our party, has not deemed it expedient to express his opinion as to what the issues will be. As I am desirous of being a delegate at large from the state of Indiana, I wish, in my entire public career, to state the substance of what I think the democratic party should stand for.

"We were in the war from the very moment of its European beginning because it affected our internal affairs. All of the methods and measures

adopted for the preservation of the peace of our country and the winning of the war met with my approval, and I am ready to defend them.

"The war now is over and the rehabilitation of America, as well as the rest of the world, is taking place. It is not possible to accomplish our reinstrumentalities of political parties. pose to rehabilitate the political sys-

mocracy and I have seen its menace in this country, until I am quite convinced that the peace, prosperity and perpetuity of the American republic must rest finally upon a few ancient and time-honored democratic doctrines.

"No one save God can remove the individual as the unit of good government. Legislative_efforts to produce justice and good order in society by listening and acceding to the demands of persons and classes will in the hour of peace produce failure. The only sure foundation for a stable republic must rest upon the Jeffersonian right to life, to liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

"The democratic party should stand for this and pledge itself to rebuild the American political structure along this line by clearly dividing its citizens into the law-abiding and lawbreaking; making its law rest equally upon all men; permtting the individual citizen who is honest to succeed by the American republic must rest honest methods; giving to no citizen legislative advantage; speedily punishing anyone who unjustly obtains success by crooked and dishonest means; recognizing that this is still a federation of states; demanding of local self-government; resisting the usurpations of the general governjudges, but standing always for

obedience to the decrees of court and constituted authority; insisting to that the legislative branch of the government shall be responsible for the discharge of its duty and serving notice upon it that it can not skulk behind an alleged interference upon the part of the executive branch; electing an executive pledged to discharge the countless officials and innumerable agents made necessary by the war and to administer public affairs along economic lines."



Carrying a Ton a Mile for less than a Cent

Freight rates have played a very small part in the rising cost of living.

Other causes - the waste of war, under-production, credit inflation - have added dollars to the cost of the necessities of life, while freight charges have added only cents.

The average charge for hauling a ton of freight a mile is less than a cent.

A suit of clothing that sold for \$30 before the war was carried 2,265 miles by rail from Chicago to Los Angeles for 16% cents.

Now the freight charge is 22 cents and the suit sells for \$50.

The cost of the suit has increased 20 dollars. The freight on it has increased only 51 cents. Other transportation charges enter into the cost of the finished article-carrying the wool to the mills and the cloth to the tailors-but these other charges amount to but a few cents more.

The \$10 pair of shoes that used to sell for \$5 goes from the New England factory to the Florida dealer for a freight charge of 573 cents-only one cent more than the pre-war rate.

Beef pays only two-thirds of a cent a pound freight from Chicago to New York.

American freight rates are the lowest in the world.
