R. E. Thomason of El Paso, B. F. Looney of Greenville, Pat M. Neff of Waco and Dwight L. Lewelling of Dallas, all avowed supporters of the present national administration, and former Senator Joseph W. Bailey, leader of the "Bailey faction" of the State democratic party and an announced anti-administration man.

Governor Hobby made his announcement in a statement of approximately 1000 words, in which he defended his administration and reviewed its achievements, and urged support of President Wilson's administra-

"One of the candidates for governor has assailed the administration of which I am the head and the party whose mandate I hold," the governor declared. "Having redeemed every platform pledge and every promise made to the people, I am anxious for the people to determine the issue.'

It is as a means of seeking this expression of the people that the governor says he is a candidate for delegate at large to the San Francisco convention. For the governorship, he declares, there are candidates "well qualified in character and ability and who stand for those principles and those achievements which have recently made the democratic party in both State and nation so to useful mankind."

#### Race Declined.

In a formal announcement statement the governor said:

"Answering appeals that have come to me from many parts of the State to enter the race prompts me to say that I will not be a candidate for governor in the primaries this year, but I will be a candidate for delegate at large to the national democratic convention. When I complete my present term I will have served three and a half years as governor, or practically that period which constitutes the customary two terms. I have no desire to hold the office for a longer period. There are candidates in the field who are well qualified in character and ability who will stand for those principles and those achievements which have recently made the democratic party in both State and nation so useful to mankind. Again, I would not complicate the political situation at this time by entering a race which would confuse many of those thousands who supported me so loyally two years ago and who now are divided in their allegiance between the several candidates for governor.

"One of the candidates for governor has assailed the administration of which I am the head and the party whose mandate I

hold. Having redeemed every platform pledge and every promise made to the people I am anxious for the people to determine the issue.

"I do not claim that I have been faultless or free of mistakes in my administration of the State's affairs. # COMPARATIVELY

Figures in Process of Revision Will Clear Many Names of That Stigma.

Washington, March 7.—It is believed that comparatively few Texans or Oklahomans will be classed as deserters when the war department announces figures showing draft evasions and desertions during the recent war, which are now in the process of revision. Figures as of July 1, 1919, show that the number of men registered under the draft in Texas was 990,552 and that the total number reported as desertions was 25.178. Of the last figure, 14,265 were accounted for as not deserters among the total who failed to respond to the notice of the draft boards, having in the meantime enlisted or were subject to other conditions which would relieve them of culpability. Of the net number of desertions, 10,-913, the government apprehended 4,209, thus leaving 6,704 subject either to an indisputable or technical charge of refusing to obey their country's mandate.


Of the total registration of 435,668 in Oklahoma, 7,677 were reported as deserters. Of this number the department has counted for 2,673, and has apprehended 2,063 of the remainder, leaving 2,941 still subject to

the charge. Owing to the neglect of either the draftee or his people to properly inform the government, it is stated that probably many are carried under the classification of "deserter." These are men who had enlisted after registration and before being drafted, and still others who, upon receiving draft notices, had concluded that all requirements had been met by their enlistment through recruiting offices in place of appearing before the draft board. Senator Harding, Republican Candidate, Expresses His Ideas at Dallas.

Dallas, Tex., March 3.-Texas has had almost every kind of political experience a state can have-but al ways as a sort of family affair within the democratic party. But now the stage takes a broader setting, for today, when United States Senator Warren M. Harding of Ohio spoke in Dallas and Fort Worth, a candidate for the republican nomination for president opened his campaign in Texas, the banner democratic state. After his speech at the city nall auditorium tonight Senator Harding left for Houston, and thereafter will visit other Texas cities. In his Dallas speech Senator Harding said—as he has been saying in other states that this national campaign will mark the end of the "solid democratic South;" that the republicans expect to elect some congressme i from Texas this year, and that the present movement of dissatisfaction within the democratic party in Texas may result in the state going republican. He added that the competition of the two great parties in Texas would be the most wholesome thing that could happen to the state, and that it will never fully come into its own, governmentally and otherwise, until it ceases to be assuredly a one-party state.

Senator Harding opposed league of nations, except with 'Americanizing reservations." criticised the president's course thereon. He urged a return to the fundamental principles of the fathers, as expressed in the constitution. He inveighed against government extravagance and insisted that this "high cost of government" must be reduced.

Everybody remembers the elaborate sweet potato\_curing plant program conducted by the Commercial Club about a year ago, and how it failed because it was so very good that our people became afraid of it. 'Everybody was doing it," they said, and the practice of curing and shipping this product was going to be so generally indulged in that the bottom would fall out of the scheme and loss of money would result. So it was thought best to abandon the effort at that time, although some few of our citizens thought it was a serious mistake, and now everybody knows it was. Here are the facts: A curing plant to hold ten thousand bushels was contemplated, and the cost would have been about \$5,000. Such a house could have been filled last fall with potatoes costing not to exceed \$1.25 a bushel, and that fifteen cents a bushel to cure them, making a total of \$1.40 per It is not too late to make arrangements to build one for this season's crop, and if the matter is taken up promptly, enough farmers can easily be induced to grow the potatoes necessary to fill such a house.

Business Men, Farmers and Wage **Workers Must File Schedules** of Income for 1919.

MARCH 15 LAST FILING DATE.

Net Incomes of \$1,000 or Over, If Single; or \$2,000 or Over If Married, Must Be Reported.

The Income Tax imposed by Act of Congress on earnings of the year 1919 is now being collected.

Returns under oath must be made on or before March 15 by every citizen and resident who had a net income for 1919 amounting to:

\$1,000 or over, if single; or if married and living apart from wife (or husband); or if widowed or divorced. \$2,000 or over, if married and living with wife (or husband).

The status of the person on the last day of the year fixes the status for the year with respect to the above

Under any of these circumstances return must be made, even though no tax is due.

Husband and wife must consider the income of both, plus that of dependent minor children, in meeting this requirement; and, if sufficient to require a return, all items must be shown in a joint return or in separate returns of husband and wife.

A single person with minor dependents must include the income of such

A minor who has a set income of \$1,000 or more is not considered a dependent, and must file a separate

Personal returns should be made on Form 1040A, unless the net income exceeded \$5,000, in which case Form 1040 should be used.

Residents of Texas should file their returns with, and make payments of Income Tax to, Alexander S, Walker, Collector of Internal Revenue, Austin

#### Campbell Wants to be Texas Delegate at Large.

Austin, Texas, March 6 .-Former Governor Thomas M. Campbell of Palestine will be a candidate for delegate at large to the national democratic convention to be held in San Francisco. He made this fact known to friends upon his arrival here today on business matters. He left this afternoon for San Antonio on private business. He expressed keen disappointment at not being able to be in Dallas today for the gathering of the clans, saying he had done everything possible to defer his present business trip, but engagements of others involved had to be considered. He said, since probable candidates for the democratic nomination are unknown this early, that he would favor sending an uninstructed delegation to San Francisco. He declared he was committed to no man for president, and his hope is to get the strongest and best candidate available.

He explained that previous to the Austin convention at the Hogg-Bailey row the custom had been to send four deelgates at large and four alternates, but that convention gave all eight the dignity of being delegates, and that method had prevailed since that time.



Those earnest men and women of Texas who for years have striven for the destruction of the liquor traffic are due for a rude awakening. State Power Subordinated.

For example, the constitution of Texas and the acts of the legislature now prohibit the manufacture transportation, sale, etc., of any beverage containing "in excess of 1 per cent alcohol." Prior to the adoption of the federal amendment it had long been firmly established that the power of the state to prohibit the manufacture, sale, etc., of any beverage which its legislature might declare to be "intoxicating" was "all-comprehensive." But, by the adoption of the federal amendment, as above noted, this power to the state has become in all things strictly subordinate to the acts of congress. Hereafter, according to the doctrines of the Shreveport rate case and scores of other cases decided by the supreme court, the state can not enact or enforce any statute or constitutional provision in conflict with any federal statute upon the subject of intoxicating liquors. It is established directly by the opinion of the supreme court of the United States, in the case of Jacob Ruppert Brewing Company vs. Caffey (40 Supreme Court Report, 141) and by implication in scores of other opinions that congress has full power to declare a "nonintoxicating" beverage to be "intoxicating;" conversely, it must be true, congress has plenary author-The vast majority of those who fav- ity to declare a beverage to be "non-
