## FEW DESERTIONS COMPARATIVELY

Figures in Process of Revision Will Clear Many Names of That Stigma.

Washington, March 7.-It is believed that comparatively few Texans or Oklahomans will be classed as deserters when the figures showing draft evasions and desertions during the recent war, which are now in the pro-
cess of revision. Figures as of uly 1,1919 , show that the number of men registered under the draft in Texas was 990,552 and that the total number reported the last figure, 14,265 were of counted for as not deserters among the total who failed to respond to the notice of the draft boards, having in the meantime enlisted or were subject to other conditions which would relieve them of culpability. Of the net number of desertions, 10,13, the government apprehended 4,209, thus leaving 6,704 subject either to an indisputable or
technical charge of refusing to bey their country's mandate Of the total registration 435,668 in Oklahoma, 7,677 were reported as deserters. Of this number the department has accounted for 2,673 , and has apprehended 2,063 of the remain-
der, leaving 2,941 still subject to der, leaving
Owing to the neglect of either the draftee or his people to properly inform the government, it
is stated that probably many are carried under the classification of "deserter." These are men who had enlisted after regstration and before being drafted, and still others who, upon receiving draft notices, had concluded that all requirements had ben met by their enisiment place of appearing before the draft board. Their action, in fact, did meet all requirements,
but in failing to follow the gov-but in failing to follow the gov-
ernment's instructions with reference to appearing or giving reason for not doing so, the charge of failure still remains against them.
Following the first announcement by the war department of the number of deserters, and ex. plaining the method by which ed, the relatives of many of the men protested that the record be allowed to stand. Many of the so-called deserters were foupd to others have received medals for heroic action. The secretary of war ruled that all cases of aleged desertion might be repened and an opportunity given the men or their relatives to clear their names.
