
BEE-KEEPING AND HONEY-MAKING

When we think of honey and bees so many of us merely think of the common little old bee and the "gums" we so often see down back of the house. In modern bee-keeping such bees and "gums" occupy about the same place as an ox cart does to a high powered automobile.

The box hive is a kind of makeshift and of various sizes. A lid is placed on top and along in the summer the owner goes out and knocks it off-generally breaking up the honey and making a mess before he even gets sight of any honey. The bees become angered and the quickest way he can get the honey out is all too slow-the good and bad, sometimes with "bee-bread" and even young bees all being cut out down to the "sticks" and thrown into a tub together. He takes as much unripe honey as he does the ripe variety and no wonder why you often hear the remark: "I can't eat honey;" neither would you like to eat slop. The tub is removed to a more sheltered place and the honey is squeezed out-and many times young bees are squeezed and you have the pleasure of eating them when you buy honey from such sources.

About a year ago Mr. H. B. Parks, at that time state antomologist, in corresponding with one of our citizens, Geo. M. Jeffus of route 6, Crockett, made the statement that east Texas was the coming bee country and Mr. Jeffus, being already interested in bee-keeping, took that statement seriously. There is a possibility of wheat going to \$5 a bushel if farm production continues to decrease. We have got to turn the tide back to rural life if we are to have a permanent prosperity. Secretary Fisher has proposed the Crockett plan for betterment of agricultural development, and it is a worthy one.'

The statement of Mr. Sackett to the effect that the cow will bring us prosperity if we will only give her a chance, is directly confirmative of all we have been preaching for the past six years right here in Crockett, and the sixty separators that are daily in service in this immediate vicinity, together with the satisfied expressions of those who are using them, is additional proof that dairying is specially adapted to this section of east Texas and if generally adopted will make good as does everywhere in the south, and we all know what the dairy cow has done for the farmers of the north.






