

Declares That He Has No Authority to Approve Items.

Austin, Texas, Feb. 12.-Govseveral of the state departments expense accounts such as travelpresented to him for approval. Garner, "but as to hides, it is both a revenue producer and a protection to the cattle industry to the extent of the revenue produced."

The shoe manufacturers are asking for a duty of 15 per cent ad valorem on their product. One witness before the committee said he spoke the sentiment of 250,000 employes in the shoe industry, and they stood for pro-tection. Mr. Garner inquired as to whether the witness would favor a duty on meat, which would be a direct protection, he stated, for the cattle industry. The witness would not answer in the affirmative.

"It all shows that some of the protectionists from the New England manufacturing centers are only for protection of their end of industry," said Mr. Garner, "but when it comes to even a revenue protection for other sections of the country and upon the raw materials the manufacturer consumes, they are not for it."

The objection of the tanners and others to a tariff on hides is that it is the by-product of the cow and that it does not enter into the value of the animal.

A. W. Rucker of Denver, former member of congress from Colorado, was today given permission to file before the committee a brief on behalf of the cattle producing organizations in favor of a duty on hides.

Controller Lon A. Smith takes the same view of the matter. The controller said he has not required approval by the governor of expense accounts of the various departments before issuing warrants. "If there was a law requiring the governor to approve or disapprove expense accounts of all the departments, he would find but little time for transaction of other business," said Controller Smith. "When a head of a department approves an expense account, we issue a warrant. But if the account looks excessive we make an investigation before drawing the warrant."

Mr. Black's speech also was a discussion of the necessity for a reduction in freight rates, which carrried with it, he said, the necessity of reducing the operating costs of railroads. To accomplish this, he pointed out, adjustments of the labor conditions would result and the cost of coal and steel reduced, which are three items of principal expense.




