The law of God deals with man as a responsible being. It has wisely and justly put upon him as the best monitor of his conduct, the finest discipline of his passions, and as the constant re minder of his obligation to his Creator-individual responsibility. The ten commandments are not addressed to society-to humanity in the aggregate. They are all in the singular number and are addressed to the individ- They recognize him as the unit of society, and impose upon him by divine law individual responsibility for the man ner of his life. The necessary correlative of individual respon sibility is individual right. Only through the possesson of the right can the individual be held
to the responsibility. to the responsibility
bill of rights in the original constitution is that since the gov ernment created by the constitution was one of only specified powers, no limitation upon those powers was deemed necessary Hamilton argued, "Why declare that things shall not be done which there is no power to do?" But the argument did not suffice. In a government which boast of being one of equal laws, the bestowal of any form of privilege is inexcusable. What right has it to furnish a public expense the means of live lihood to sorne and withhold sim
ilar dispensations from other just as deserving?
In all these utopian scheme for reducing men to servile de pendence upon the government instead of their own industry and thrift, and which makes lar resse of the sacred trust of tax tion, the attempt is being boldly made to put us under the bond ge of socialism.
The idea of Seisin-possession nd ownership, lies at the roc of the whole English and American law of property. Says Sir

Black stone declared: "The absolute right inherent in every English man is that of property, which consists in the free enjoyment and disposal of all his acquisitions without any control or diminution save only by the law of he land.
There can be no just or lawfu overnmental power to enric he citizen, or to create unequa privileges in his favor or to his rejudice, or to shackle his lawul right to contract, or abridge hs liberty to labor as he seeq fit or his self-advancement. Da id Hume declared that Adam mith's Wealth of Nations was he most valuable production o he human mind. Touching th own labor and utter want of any athority in government to con trol it, the great Scotch philoso pher said this: "The property bor, as it is the original foundation of all other property, so it is the most sacred and inviolate,
The patrimony of the poor man lies in the dexterity and strength of his hands, and to hinder him from employing this manner he thinks proper, with out injury to his neighbor, is a plain violation of the most sared right of property."

## KLAN COBLIN SAYS THERE ARE 700,000 KLANSMENINU.S.

Official Gives Cleveland Police Chief Data on Organization.

Cleveland, O., Sept. 29.-There are approximately 700,000 members of the Ku Klux Klan in the United States, Charles W. Love f Indianapolis, grand goblin of the organization, with jurisdicion over Ohio, Wisconsin, Michgan, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky and West Virginia, told County Prosecutor Edward C. Stanton and Chief of Police Frank W. Smith Thursday.
Love voluntarily appeared before Stanton and Chief Smith. He said he came here from ChiHe said he came here from Ch. cago when he learned that a
grand jury investigation had grand jury
been ordered.
Love was in conference with he officials more than four hours, during which he explained he constitution of the order, how much various officials reeive as commission on initiation ees, which he called "donaions," who is barred from the order or "disqualified" as he preferred to call it, and withheld only information regarding membership.
He promised to produce the books and records of the local branch Friday
"The membership roll is secret, and it is in Atlanta, Ga., the headquarters of the order," Mr. ove told his interrogators.

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## WOMANPARTY ASKS

 FOR BILL OF RIGHTSConstitutional Amendment Demand to Remove Disabilities.

Washington, Sept. 25.-A wo man's bill of rights proposed by enactment by the federal and al state governments to remove all legal discriminations against wo men was outlined today in statement by the national wo man's party.
The program includes a new constitutional amendment de elaring that "no political, civil or legal disabilities or inequalitie on account of sex or on accoun
of marriage" shall prevail, to of marriage" shall prevail, to-
gether with a bill to give women gether with a bill to give women
the same rights, privileges and immunities as men.
It was announced that Senator Curtī, republican, Kansas, and Representative Fess, republican, Ohio, would introduce the new proposed constitutional amend ment in congress Oct. 1 and that copies of the new bill had been sent to all state chairmen of the woman's party except Wiscon$\sin$, wh
the law.
Women would have the right apon marriage to choose their upon marriage to choose their
names and have equal voice in names and have equal voice in
custody of their children, legicustody of their children, legiproposed new bill of the women's organization.
Other legal rights for women proposed include:
Suffrage, eligibility for all of fices, freedom of contract, choic of domicile, residence or name jury service, acquisition and control of property, control o labor and earnings, eligibility for fiduciary positions, equali ty in grounds for divorce and penalties for sex offenses.
All common law disabilities o women would be abrogated under the legislation.

Word immediately tele phoned the state inspector and wired the facts to Washington An investigation by the postal authorities is now being made, but as yet the money has not been found. It is the opinion of many that the pouch was ripped open and the cash taken out, but this can not be verified as the pouch has not been located yet.
