KLAN GOBLIN SAYS THERE ARE 700,000 KLANSMEN IN U.S.

Official Gives Cleveland Police Chief Data on Organization.

Cleveland, O., Sept. 29.—There are approximately 700,000 members of the Ku Klux Klan in the United States, Charles W. Love of Indianapolis, grand goblin of the organization, with jurisdiction over Ohio, Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky and West Virginia, told County Prosecutor Edward C. Stanton and Chief of Police Frank W. Smith Thursday.

Love voluntarily appeared before Stanton and Chief Smith. He said he came here from Chicago when he learned that a grand jury investigation had been ordered.

Love was in conference with the officials more than four hours, during which he explained the constitution of the order, how much various officials receive as commission on initiation fees, which he called "donations," who is barred from the order or "disqualified" as he preferred to call it, and withheld only information regarding membership.

He promised to produce the books and records of the local branch Friday.

"The membership roll is secret, and it is in Atlanta, Ga., the headquarters of the order," Mr. Love told his interrogators.

Both Prosecutor Stanton and Chief Smith questioned Love at length about nightriding activities of the Ku Klux Klan and tar and feathering episodes credited to masked members of the organization.

MAN PARTY ASKS FOR BILL OF RIGHTS
