YANCEY DECRIBES BIG CATASTROPHE

Washington, D. C., January 30, 1922.

Dear Mr. Aiken: The capital has been buried underneath a twenty-four inch snow since last Friday afternoon and little of it has melted today, Monday. The storm struck the city at 4:30 in the afternoon and by seven that evening six inches of snow had fallen and continued to fall until early Sunday morning. It was more snow than many people here had ever seen before and the storm was the worst since the blizzard of 1899 when thirty-six inches covered the ground, it was officially announced by the weather bureau. Because of the fact that such a storm is seldom seen here the local government lacks the facilities for clearing the streets, and as a result of the conditions the steadfastness and the white of all the thouroughfares, many fire engines were stalled and all fire-fighting apparatus was delayed in answering calls from the district where the roof of the Knickerbocker Theatre caved in, killing 108 and injuring many more in one of the worst catastrophes of the country. The accident occurred at 8:20 o'clock Saturday evening and many lives that could have been saved if tools and apparatus had been obtainable were lost. 
