## Pure Oil Geologist Here.

BRAZORIA COUNTY FOR ERADICATION OF CATTLE TICKS

Federal Inspector Finds Sentiment Favorable; Work Begins April 1.

Angleton, Texas, March 18.Brazoria county is 100 per cent for the eradication of the cattle tick.
This is the opinion of Glen R. Péck, supervisor for this county, epresenting the federal bureau of animal industry and the State government in the tick campaign. Mr. Peck has been in all sections of the county and he is meeting with the co-operation of every cattleman in his district. He maintains his office here, which is the center of the county, so that he can keep in close ouch with the work.
Material for the vats in the various sections of the county has been purchased, and work is to start upon their construction during the next few days. The vats will be built with lumber, and it has been proven that vats of this construction are far superior to concrete and similar vats.
Chas. F. Wright of Alvin has been appointed by the county as supervisor and will be under and work in conjunction with the federal supervisor. Mr. Wright will be assisted by 12 inspectors, located in the various sections of the county. These inspectors have been appointed and just as soon as the vats are completed they will enter into the work and rush it to a finish.
Mr. Peck believes that the prairie section of the county will e cleared by the end of the coming summer and the entire county will be clear of ticks within the next two years.
The commissioners court has appropriated $\$ 32,000$ to carry on the work, which includes building the vats, furnishing the dip, of which 5000 gallons already has been purchased, and the salaries of the different in the salari
spectors.
With the cattlemen working in harmony with the officials and the county it is hoped that the work will be under full headway by April 1.

Washington, March 8.-Be ware of the sex detector, say the department of agriculture It is widely advertised as one of the greatest marvels of the age, but there is nothing the department asserts in a for mal statement.
According to its manufactur ers and publicity agents, the de tector is a small instrument that will unfailingly indicate the sex and fertility of eggs, the depart ment says, adding that poultry raisers were promised phenomenal hatches and as high a per centage of females as they might desire by its use.
"But this was only part of simple but potent little device, declares the department in a re cent circular. "It was said to tell the sex of oysters, butter-
flies, caterpillars, beetles, worms, fies, caterpilars, beetles, worms, from which wer obtained such from which wer obtained such
