DEATH TOLL HIGH **DURING YEAR AT GRADE CROSSINGS**

Austin, Texas, May 27.—Sevgates from fifteen counties in enty-eight persons were killed in railroad grade crossing accidents in 1921, and 257 injured, according to reports to the state railroad commission announced today in connection with the four months "careful crossing" campaign of the American Railway association.

> The railroad commission, in a statement addressed "to the people of Texas," declared that re-ports on file show that many of the accidents which have occurred at railroad crossings, particularly since the use of the automobile has become common, are due to the carelessness and inattention of the drivers of vehicles. The automobile casualty list on grade crossings is nearly 90 per cent of the total number of accidents and killings.






