What the Former A. \& M. President Writes in the Rusk County News.

If the reader was informed that not less than 750 square miles of fertile lands were to be planted to cotton in 1923 in West Texas and New Mexico above the acreage of 1922 he would express surprise. But such is the of Commerce, with its pulse on every new development of West 'Texas and East New Mexico, has of recent months been itself agreeably startled by the phe-
nomenal development from an agricultural standpoint that i now taking place in the extreme western counties of West Texas Mexico. The encroachment King Cotton has extended it sphere to the Panhandle, where until last year, no cotton wa ever grown.

Increase Cotton Acreage. From the reports the organi zation has received it has com
piled a tabulation which indica piled a tabulation which indica
ted that not less than 500,000 acres of land never before plant ed to cotton will be given over to that staple during 1923. Ap proximately 250,000 of this 500 , 000 acres is entirely new land that has never felt the touch of the plow. Such a vast acreage dedicated to an entirely new
crop, in so far as the territory i crop, in so far as the territory is
concerned, is certainly a matter of great import not only to the section which has turned to the staple for its support, and prosperity another year, but also to
the country at large, which had supposed that the extreme west ern portion of the state was un-
fit for other than range vurfor other than range pur
poses. If the crop matures well the fertile soils with their vit amines may increase the crop production of West Texas not ess than 250,000 bales by har nerease in cotton production in
