That is an honest policy and the state should pursue the same policy.

Roberts, Sayers, Lanham and Campbell lived up to that standard in private and public life. And each of them had grayheaded economists who as representatives of the people assisted them in carrying out that policy. Why can't we have a legislature like that now? In those days few people complained of outrageous taxes. Land values have increased about sixfold in twenty years of taxation, hundreds of thousands of new enterprises have come in for taxation. For these reasons the tax rate has increased about three fold. This refers to state ad valorem and school taxes. Seventy-five cents, the limit under the constitution, has been reached. Therefore the reason for a new constitution is to raise the tax rate.

No doubt big business would like to repeal or amend the homestead law. It is now common to hear men of progressive ideas say there is no incentive to acquire any more property. Taxes will eat up the profits. In 1901 the assessed valuation in Caldwell County in round numbers was about 24c. In 1922 assessed valuation was \$13,000.

> The severance tax is a tax on the taking of those forms of wealth which nature has put on and under the surface of the earth and the endowed value of which is greater than that which they acquire from the labor of man. It, too, has the sanction of custom. Pennsylvania taxes every ton of anthracite mined within its boundaries, and that is a severance tax, though commonly miscalled a production tax. Of all taxes, none perhaps is more easily and certainly passed on to the ultimate consumer. That facility is its preeminent virtue. Its toll is taken of consumption. Those who make use of the things taxed pay in proportion of their expropriation of a common heritage. Hence it has a moral warrant in that the tax is paid by the user, and economic warrant in that it does not operate as a penalty on the enterprise of making the thing taxed available for individual use.

IF WAR COMING **BRITAIN IS READY COMMONS TOLD**

King George Says Turks Are Counting on Nation's Weariness of Battle Days.

London, Feb. 13.—Parliament reassembled today with questions of gravest import facing it for consideration. Premier Bonar Law touched on two of these, the Near East and the Ruhr, the first involving relations with Turkey and the whole Moslem world and the second having a close bearing on the existing relations between France and Great Britain.

There has been much discussion as to whether the British troops would be withdrawn from the Rhineland. The prime minister said today he hoped it would be possible to retain the troops there but to a large extent that would depend on France and Germany, either of whom could make their retention in German territory impos-

Withdrawal of the British troops from the Rhine, Mr. Bonar Law declared, would be a great misfortune, for that would mean the end of the Entente.
