#### **BRYAN OPTIMISTIC** IN SPEECH AT R. R. **VALUATION MEET**

FEARS GOVERNMENT OWN-ERSHIP WILL CENTRAL-IZE POWER.

Chicago, May 26. — William Jennings Bryan in addressing the national railroad valuation conference, called by Senator LeFollette, of Wisconsin, and others of the "progressive blocs" today that he did not like to think of government ownership but was afraid it might be forced on the country.

The great orator of the democratic party said that 24 years ago he suggested government ownership of the railroads, but points. asserted that he "feared centralization of power in Washington."

He declared that God did not make men good enough to withstand the temptations of monop-

olistic control. Mr. Bryan said he had been a reformer for 42 years and that

for 35 years he had been actively interested in the transportation problem.

Referring to "blocs" in congress, he said there was nothing new in such a term; that there had been blocs friendly to financial interests long before the term was used and that those blocs were always on the job. #### **RUMORS OF FLOOD** DAMAGE GIVE RISE TO COTTON BOOST

HEAVY RAINS, COLD GIVE UNFAVORABLE TONE TO REPORTS.

New Orleans, La., May 27 .-Prices were higher, almost from the opening, in the cotton market last week. Lower prices were reached on the opening session when the trading positions were in and out of congress, declared nine to 18 points under the level of the preceding week's close; from this there was a rise of 181 to 220 points, which carried the market 172 to 208 points higher than the closing of the preceding week. 



Washington, May 28,-A definite but informal offer to purchase the entire active portion of ARMY MEN TO TRY the government merchant mafine fleet has been received by the shipping board in the form of a single bid.

The proposal was delivered to members of the board late today by a representative of a group of financial interests, whose identity was not disclosed. The envoy of the bidders offered to post a bond of \$1,000,000 as a guarantee of sincerity. The aggregate amount suggested was said to be in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000,000.

Persons close to the board declared that the financial standing of those composing the group was of the highest type.

Submission of the proposal became known after announcement had been made that the board had received twenty bids in response to an invitation for bids for its fleet. Chairman Lasker said only four or five of the offers presented possibilities, although four others were in the "twilight zone."


