Airplane Theft is Latest; Cops Nab First Suspect.

One man is in the county jail and police of Houston and Galveston are searching for four others believed to be members of a band of airplane thieves operating in this vicinity. A search of nearly three weeks ended early Saturday with the arrest of a 25-year-old Galveston aviator on a charge of stealing the fuselage of an airplane from the factory of the Curtis Airship and Motor corporation on the interurban between Houston and Galveston.

The stolen machine was recovered Friday on a field near Camp Logan and was identified by R. C. Lotstrom, 2517 St. Emanuel street, manager of the Curtis branch here. Efforts had been made to remove the serial numbers, which, however, had proven unsuccessful. The machine was stolen three weeks ago from the factory and taken to Galveston on a motor truck. Later it was brought to this city on a truck. It was being set up when detectives located it.

The aviator held on a theft charge, filed in Justice Campbell Overstreet's court Saturday, is well known in this section, having made a number of flights above Houston during the past several months.

The stolen fuselage and other parts had a value of \$400.—Houston Post.
