



In his address at Hutchinson devoted to discussion of the agricultural situation, the chief executive reviewed the measures taken by the government to aid the farmers, placing at the fore-front the farm credits legislation enacted by the last congress. This legislation, when carried out, he declared, "will be capable of furnishing the American farmers, for the first time in the history of agriculture in any country, adequate investment and working capital on terms as favorable as those accorded to commerce and industry." Furthermore, he said, it will tend to restore fair prices for farm products and aid the farmer in lifting debts incurred during the

period of depression.
"I confess a frank pride in the government's part in bettering a situation against which you justly complained and which all the people of the nation deplored," the president told his audience in this agricultural State.


