Lion Caged After Gnawing Way to Freedom.

Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 14 .-After twelve hours' freedom, roaming two connecting express cars on eastbound Santa Fe train No. 8, which arrived here early Saturday, a lion was safely caged and Saturday night was en route to Louisville, Ky.

Hundreds of persons swarmed the Kansas City terminal yards Saturday afternoon and were thrilled while a crew from the Swope Park Zoo caged the beast. After efforts had failed to entice the lion with bait, N. T. Clarke, superintendent of the zoo, put a lasso on the animal's neck and pulled it into a waiting

age. The lion's freedom was discovered by John Ralston, express messenger, who awakened just east of Emporia, Kan., and gulped when he saw an untenanted cage in the same car. The lion had liberated itself by gnawing the wood away from the

iron bars in the cage. Cautiously Ralston ventured

into the car ahead. The lion, atop some boxes, met his gaze and started toward him. The messenger left that car with speed, securely bolting the door. Later he bolted the door of the second car ahead. The lion paced back and forth, pawing over express packages.

Passengers were unaware that a wild beast was stalking the express cars ahead. At Argentine, Kan., a suburb of Kansas City, the cars were switched off together for the upbuilding of and a hurry-up call sent for Clarke.

The lion was put on the train by K. C. Beck at Hutchinson, Kan., consigned to Floyd King in Louisville.







Dallas, Texas, Jan. 31.—"It would please me very much if our students adopted simpler and less expensive habits in every way," said President C. C. Selecman, president of Southern Methodist University, in commenting upon a recent statement on the subject by President Stratton D. Brooks of the University Stratton D. Brooks of the University of Missouri. "For example, many of our fraternities and sororities are costing young people more money than their parents think necessary. 
