Editor Courier: Users of standard fertilizer formulas recommend by the be on their guard against using lower grades of fertilizers that fertilizers, according to advices from Dr. G. S. Fraps, chief of
the division of chemistry, Texas the division of chemistry, Texas chemist, who is charged with the administration of the fer Fraps points out that the second figure in the formulas recom-
mended represents nitrogen and not ammonia. A 12-4-4 fertilizer, for example, should contain
12 per cent phosphoric acid, per cent nitrogen and 4 per cent
potash. In some states the zecond figure of the formula is used to denote the ammonia content of the value of the nitrogen content and some manufacturers and for reasons of their own, use a number whose component fig correspond with the numbers usually used to represent the 3.3-4 fertilizer in Texes would b a 12-4-4 fertilizer in Georgia and the designation, "No. 1244" would be closely connected with the formula; but when it is considered that the first 4 in Geor-
gia refers to ammonia and not to nitrogen, and that the formu $12-3.3-4$ in Texas, the designation "No. 1244" could be signa mislead the Texas purchaser Doctor Fraps states these num bers are going to be changed on fertilizers sold in Texas so as not to be misleading. He mentions also that information has come to him that one or two fer tilizer manufacturers are offering some of these fertilizers of nitrogen than required in the of nitrogen than required in the salesmen claim them to be standard fertilizers. They are selling these at a lower price, but it ought to be known that the formulas are not the standard formulas recommended for use in Texas. Purchasers of the stand ard formulas and other fertiliz ers should always read the guar and not by any other representa tion.
Following are the eleven standard formulas recommended: 12 3-0 containing 12 per cent of available phosphoric acid and 3 per cent nitrogen; 10-4-0 con taining 10 per cent of availabl phosphoric acid and 4 per cent nitrogen, $8-4$-4 containing 8 pe cent of available phosphoric acio
4 per cent nitrogen and 4 pe $12-2-2,12-3-3,12-4-4,10-4-2,8-$
$4-6, \quad 12-0-4$, of corresponding ing the same percentages of phosphoric acid and potash, bu lower percentages of nitrogen are not recommended.
