Leediker, Crockett. a 12-4-4 fertilizer in Georgia, and the designation, "No. 1244" would be closely connected with Ohio. the formula; but when it is considered that the first 4 in Georgia refers to ammonia and not to nitrogen, and that the formula would have to be stated as La. 12-3.3-4 in Texas, the designation "No. 1244" could be used to mislead the Texas purchaser. Doctor Fraps states these numbers are going to be changed on fertilizers sold in Texas so as not to be misleading. He mentions also that information has come to him that one or two fertilizer manufacturers are offering some of these fertilizers which contain lower percentages of nitrogen than required in the water. standard formulas and that their salesmen claim them to be standard fertilizers. They are selling these at a lower price, but it ought to be known that the formulas are not the standard for- Rt. 1. mulas recommended for use in Texas. Purchasers of the standard formulas and other fertiliz- Rt. 2. ers should always read the guaranteed analysis and go by this and not by any other representa-

Following are the eleven standard formulas recommended: 12-3-0 containing 12 per cent of available phosphoric acid and 3 Rt. 2. per cent nitrogen; 10-4-0 containing 10 per cent of available phosphoric acid and 4 per cent nitrogen; 8-4-4 containing 8 per cent of available phosphoric acid, 4 per cent nitrogen and 4 per cent potash; and 7-5-5, 8-7-0, 12-2-2, 12-3-3, 12-4-4, 10-4-2, 8-4-6, 12-0-4, of corresponding composition. Fertilizers containing the same percentages of phosphoric acid and potash, but one of its recent meetings, purlower percentages of nitrogen, chased five road graders and are not recommended.
