



## HEALTH OFFICER **COMMENDS ACTION**

It is a source of much gratification to the county health officer that quite a number of the population residing in the rural districts of Houston county are interested in desiring to establish modern sanitation in and around their homes, and in this connection I stand ready to serve the rural population and the unincorporated communities of Houston county. I have also been successful in making arrangment with the state board of health, whereby specimens of water from wells, cisterns and springs can be tested; stereopticon slide lectures shown in the schools; movie reels in the communities that have electric light systems; plans on well and cistern protection, residential sewage disposal plants, and furnish gambusia minnows, the agency now commonly used in controlling mosquito breeding in stock ponds and cisterns, when desir-

I also wish to commend our Houston county population for their foresightedness in the screening of their homes, and have only one suggestion to make-that they use sixteenmesh wire rather than fourteenmesh wire, which will keep out the smallest mosquito, and thereby reduce the menace of malaria to the minimum.

## EAST TEXAS R. R. **GRANTED RIGHT TO** ABANDON TRACTS

SUPREME COURT HOLDS ROAD CAN WITHDRAW PROPERTY.

Washington, Feb. 18.—The Eastern Texas Railway company cannot be prohibited by the State of Texas from abandoning Halifax Echo which describes court decided today in two cases, one brought by the State and the other by the Texas railroad commission.

The court declared the road had a right to withdraw its property from public use when it no longer was possible to operate it except at a loss.

Texas authorities contended that the charter under which the railroad was constructed was a binding contract compelling operation of trains. The company insisted it could not be forced to operate at a loss.

It is supplied by three wells ranging in depth from 400 to 500 feet. The depth gives purity to the water, which is found in waterbearing sand and is filtered through the sand in which it is found. When necessary to supply the demand, another well will be added to the group of three now in use.
