standpipe that holds $75,000 \mathrm{gal}$ standpipe that holds $75,000 \mathrm{gal}$
lons and is filled twice daily keeping the city's water supply in constant circulation. No city enjoys purer and better water, and there is no wonder that the city empties the standpipe twice a day, the water is so clear and good. Upwards of 150,000 gallons are used every day, or about $5,000,000$ gallons in a month. This water is pumped by elec-
tricity from the city's wells near the electric light plant. It is supplied by three wells ranging in depth from 400 to 500 feet. The depth gives purity to the
water, which is found in water-bearing sand and is filtered through the sand in which it is found. When necessary to supply the demand, another well will now in use.
