When sentence was pronounced, through his attorneys, Tom F. Coleman and E. J. Cohn, appointed by the court, he waived his right of two days of grace in order to file a motion for a new trial.

The hearing went on under the protection of State rangers and the militia. None except those having business there were allowed in the court room. But two blocks away a crowd formed that filled the long squares. Back and forth before the throng the soldiers marched to prevent any from breaking over an agreed "dead-line." But at no time was there a demonstration.

When the court had adjourned the crowd broke up and scattered to its members' various occupations. The sentiment seemed to be that the negro got his just deserts and got them in a legal way.

The rangers were in personal command of Adjutant General Thomas D. Barton, and with the sentencing of the negro he said that he would be taken to the penitentiary at once.

The task of choosing a jury began early in the day. Fortytwo men were examined before 12 were selected as qualified to sit. But of the 42 only one said he was opposed to capital punish-







DISABLED MONTANA TOWED TO HALIFAX

Atlantic Transport Liner Had Rudder Head and Tiller Smashed.

From the Halifax Echo.

With her rudder broken at the gine twisted out of shape and stream. The steamer Poland, of much more serious. the same line, which had towed the disabled steamer to the harbor, and then turned the ship over to tugs, also came into port. 


