ederal Trade Chief Says Attorney General Failed to Prosecute.

Washington, April 22.-Chair: man Huston Thompson of the ederal trade commission. today aid before the Daugherty investigating committee further evidence to support his testimony that anti-trust cases were ot properly prosecuted under Attorney General Daugherty, afhad been developed by the commission and turned over to the justice department.
Turning from conditions in the tobacco industry which he lescribed at length yesterday, he commission chairman related how he and his colleagues uncovered "price fixing" and "coercive measures" among lumber producers in an investigation be-
ginning in 1919 . The results of his inquiry, he said, were laid before the justice department before Mr. Daugherty took ofice. Suit against the Southern ine association was instituted in the closing days of the Wilson dministration, he declared, but has remained in status quo" ever since and now rests in the district court at Kansas City. Mr. Thompson explained includ, d most of the large manufacturers of that commodity.
"The investigation as we reported it to the department of ustice," he said, "showed price fixing and price regulation and production restriction by different groups of the Southern Pine association and coercive measures towards various concerns to with the association."

## PRECINCTCOUNTY CONVENTIONS AGAIN

## Crockett, Texas,

 To the Democrats of Housto County Since issuing the call for the precinct and county conventions I have received some instructions from the state democratic the manner of holding such conventions and making suggestions relative thereto, and which may be summerized as follows:Precinct Conventions.
I. The precinct conventions may be held at any time between 10 o clock a. m. and 8 oclock p. m., the hour to be designated by the place for holding the same. 2. 6. The number of delegates to the county convention is not mandatory, but it is suggested for not less than one delegate ornor in the precinct in the last preceding primary election be selected.
