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## EDITOR SLAIN AT CALLIHAM

Former Deputy Is Held; Publisher Was Unarmed, Witness Says.

San Antonio, Texas, July 22.—Jay R. Secrest, 32, publisher of the Calliham Caller, was shot twice and instantly killed by J. M. Stitz, formerly a deputy sheriff of McMullen county, Monday night. He had no chance to defend himself, according to Judge W. E. Smith, eyewitness to the shooting, which took place on the street at Calliham at 8 o'clock Monday night. Calliham is a one-year-old oil town located 10 miles west of Three Rivers.

Stitz is in jail at Tilden, the county seat, in connection with the shooting. According to Judge Smith, who is partially paralyzed, Secrest had picked him up in his small roadster and was taking him to the hotel at Calliham. Stitz, with whom Secrest is said to have had trouble a short while ago, followed in another car and stopped Secrest. Drawing a 38-caliber rifle, Stitz is said to have demanded that Secrest retract statements alleged to have been printed in the Calliham Caller attacking Stitz' character.

Secrest refused to retract the statements, according to Judge Smith, and without a word, Stitz shot him twice.

The first bullet hit Secrest in the neck, severing the jugular vein, and the second struck him in the heart, killing him instantly. Secrest was unable to get out of the car, Judge Smith said, adding that he was unarmed.

Stitz and Secrest are said to have had some trouble about two or three weeks ago when the former was a deputy sheriff. After the argument Stitz was relieved of his badge and gun. The latter swore out a complaint against Secrest, charging interference with an officer. The trial was to have come up this week.

After the trouble Secrest is said to have published an article in his newspaper attacking Stitz.

Although the Klan issue has predominated in the political disputes in that section, where Secrest was a candidate for the legislature, it is, said that question was not involved in the killing. Both men were very prominent and the shooting has aroused considerable excitement in Calliham and vicinity. Secrest was a major in the army during the world war. His parents reside at Hallettsville. He was unmarried.

An inquest was held at Tilden at midnight following the shooting by County Judge Dan Martin.

Local Marine Leaves for Tropics.

Quantico, Va., July 16.—The little republic of Haiti in the West Indies will soon be visited by Miles Clement Hammond, formerly of Lovelady, Texas, who left here recently with a detachment of U. S. Marines. He will probably remain in Haiti for a year or longer before returning to the United States.

Miles, who is a son of Mrs. Cora Hammond of Lovelady, joined the marine corps at Houston in March, 1923. He was stationed at Quantico several weeks before leaving for Hampton Roads, Va., where he embarked on a naval vessel for Haiti.

Detachments of U. S. Marines have been on duty in Haiti since 1915, when a force landed there to restore order during a revolution. Peaceful conditions now prevail, and most of the sea soldiers are now stationed at Port au Prince, the capital. Athletic sports, moving pictures and entertainments break the monotony of the regular military routine.

## JAILER MUSICK KNOCK ON HEAD

Negro Prisoner, Known as "Fuzzy," Makes Temporary Escape.

At an early hour Monday morning, as Jailer Will Musick was preparing to give his prisoners their breakfast, he was hit on the head with a gun barrel in the hands of a negro vagrant known as "Fuzzy" and blinded with the flow of blood from a scalp wound. As "Fuzzy" ran past the jailer, he was shot at by the officer, but missed.

The night before being hot, and "Fuzzy" being in prison only for some minor offense, he had been given the benefit of the run-around by the jailer. Entering the run-around with food for the prisoners Monday morning, Jailer Musick ordered "Fuzzy" into one of the cages, which order the prisoner started to comply with. "Fuzzy" had secreted an old gun barrel on the inside of the cage, which he grabbed up and whirled on the officer, hitting the officer a terrible blow on the forehead. Blinded from the force of the blow and the blood from the wound, Jailer Musick shot several times, but his aim was inaccurate. The negro made his escape from the jail before outsiders knew what had happened, the time being very early in the morning.

Sheriff Hale was notified by telephone and started in pursuit, joined by a citizens' posse. The negro was tracked through fields and across roads until the Trinity river was reached, where it was found that he had crossed into Leon county. He outraveled his pursuers by keeping to the fields and woods, a part of the time his trail being lost altogether. Leon county officers were notified by Sheriff Hale, and the negro was overtaken at Marquez, where he attempted to board a freight train. Leon county officers telephoned to Crockett that they had the negro wanted and Jailer Musick left for Marquez Wednesday afternoon to bring his prisoner back to Crockett.

"Fuzzy" came to Crockett with a carnival last fall and had been around town since that time. He was in jail for some minor offense and was not considered a very bad negro. Once during the chase Monday afternoon the officers came within sight of him, but he managed to elude them and escape into the woods. The officers did not want to kill the negro unless as a last resort to effect his arrest.

Mrs. J. E. Bean Dead.

Mrs. C. E. Bean, wife of Rev. J. E. Bean, died at the home of her son, J. A. Bean, Saturday, July 12, 1924, after an illness of four months duration. At her request she was removed to her son's home three weeks prior to her death. Death was due to a weak heart.

Her remains were laid to rest Sunday morning in the Parker cemetery, Rev. W. H. Kolb conducting the services, singing led by Norman Lasiter.

It is said that Mrs. Bean suffered much during her long illness, but bore it with Christian fortitude and patience. Just prior to her death she called the family around her bedside and

said she was willing and ready to die, knowing that she would be received in the arms of her Lord, whom she had trusted so long. She was a member of the Missionary Baptist church and had lived a Christian life since childhood.

Mrs. Bean was born in Thomas County, Georgia, July 22, 1845. She was 78 years, 11 months and 20 days old. She was married to Mr. Bean August 21, 1872. She had been a citizen of Houston county since March 15, 1877.

She was the mother of six children, five of whom survive her: Messrs. J. A., J. I., E. P. and Zay Bean and Mrs. Jim Kolb. She is also survived by her husband, 36 grand-children and 5 great grand children.—Grapeland Messenger.

## WHEELER SOUNDS NEW PARTY KEYNOTE

Washington, July 19.—Senator Wheeler of Montana, who won national distinction by his conduct of the senate Daugherty investigation, accepted the vice presidential nomination on the La Follette independent ticket today and immediately began his campaign with a broadside against the political affiliations of Calvin Coolidge and John W. Davis.

"I am a democrat, but not a Wall Street democrat," he said in a letter formally accepting the nomination tendered him by the group of La Follette leaders in conference here.

The democratic party, he continued, has "wantonly abandoned an opportunity for great public service, and both it and the republican party have ignored the call of the unorganized millions who are victims of the present economic disorders."

An old-time barbecue was given by Mr. A. B. Burton at his farm eight miles west of Crockett Wednesday. Relatives of Mr. Burton and a few friends and neighbors enjoyed the event. After the white people had finished, the negro tenants of the farm were given a barbecued dinner. Barbecued beef, pork, mutton and kid, together with bread, pickles and iced tea, followed with various kinds of cake, constituted the dinner. These barbecues are annual affairs with Mr. Burton.

## STATUS OF RAIL BODY PECULIAR

Three New Commissioners May Be Elected for First Time.

Austin, Texas, July 22.—A situation never contemplated by the railroad commission law now confronts the voters of Texas. The constitution of Texas, article 16, section 30, provides that the railroad commission shall be composed of three commissioners, and that the term of office shall be six years, except that the three first elected draw lots for the two, four and six-year terms. This was done in order that only one commissioner could be replaced by a new man at any given election.

Proper construction of the law would be that the intention of the law was that a majority of the commission should always be composed of experienced men and that one railroad commissioner shall be elected every two years.

The situation now confronting the voters of the State is a most peculiar one in that the death of Allison Mayfield, the resignation of Earle B. Mayfield, now junior United States senator, and the election of Dr. Walter Splawn as president of the University of Texas makes possible the election of an entirely new commission this year. As one State official remarked this would be a most unfortunate condition and would defeat the purpose of the constitution.

Judge H. E. Bell, chief supervisor of the oil and gas division, commenting upon the situation, said: "The successor of Dr. Splawn must necessarily be a new man. Commissioner Clarence E. Gilmore has served just one term and is a candidate for a second term. Commissioner W. A. Nabors has served 16 months in the place made vacant by the death of Allison Mayfield and is asking election to complete the four years of the unexpired term. The defeat of either Gilmore or Nabors would place the commission under the control of two new and inexperienced men—contrary to the plan of the constitution—and every consideration of prudence.

"If these two are defeated it will really mean three new members, as Dr. Splawn has no opposition for re-election, but as he has been elected to the presidency of the university he will resign shortly after the primary election next Saturday.

"Commissioners Gilmore and Nabors have shown by their service that they are good men and well qualified for the places they hold. Democratic precedent suggests the wisdom of re-election of both Gilmore and Nabors. For these reasons I am strong for the re-election of Gilmore and the election of Nabors for the six and four-year terms of railroad commissioner."

Joe Sallas Speaks.

Joe Sallas of Bell county, who spoke at the court house Saturday afternoon at 2:30 in the interest of the candidacy of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson for governor, was heard by a crowd that filled the court house to overflowing. He received much applause during his speech. Joe formerly represented Houston county in the legislature and has a strong personal following.

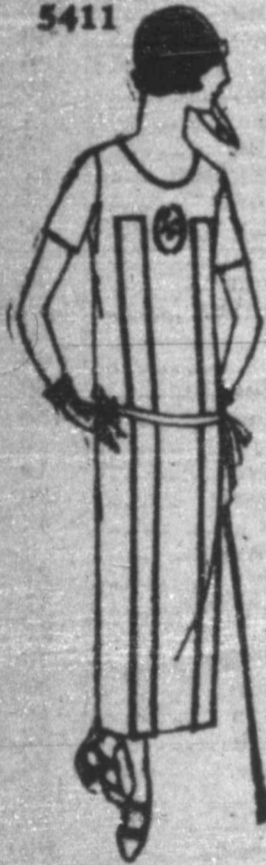

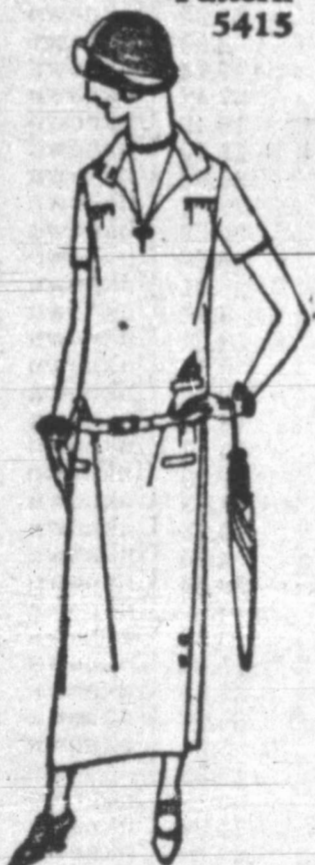

**PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION.**

**Relating to Granting of Confederate Pensions.**

Senate Joint Resolution No. 10  
Proposing an amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas since prior to January 1, 1910, providing that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof shall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven (\$.07) cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation of property in this State for the payment of such pension providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purposes, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment and making an appropriation to pay the expenses thereof.

**Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:**

Section 1. Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever, provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent or disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors, who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1910, and to their widows, in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fide residents of this State since January 1, 1910, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors prior to January 1, 1910, and to indigent and disabled soldiers who under the special laws of the State of Texas during the war between the States served in organizations for the protection of the frontier against Indian raiders or Mexican marauders and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State of Texas who were in active service during the war between the States and to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1910, provided that the word "widow" in the preceding lines of this section shall not apply to women born since the year 1861, and all soldiers and sailors and widows of soldiers and sailors eligible under the above conditions shall be entitled to be placed upon the pension rolls and participate in the distribution of the pension fund of this state under any existing law or laws hereafter passed by the Legislature, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law, provided the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together, in the home. There is hereby levied in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas a State ad valorem tax on property of seven (\$.07) cents on the one hundred (\$100) dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy,

frontier organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate herein levied, and provided further that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1924, at which all voters shall have printed or written on their ballots: "For amendment of Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows who have been a resident of this State since January 1, 1910," and "Against amendment to Section 51 of Article 3, of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers and their widows."

Sec. 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the general funds of this State not otherwise appropriated for expenses of publications and elections thereunder.

**Davis Nomination Unexpected.**

The nomination was entirely unexpected, as the West Virginian had stood in third place in the balloting throughout a good part of the long succession of the roll call. When it had been made unanimous after the usual custom the standard of every state was carried around the hall in a great demonstration of party enthusiasm which appeared to submerge the bitterness of the titanic struggle fought out since opening fall of the gavel on June 24.

But in some quarters there lingered disappointment and chagrin. Some of the Smith supporters felt deeply the failure of their candidate to land the prize, although Governor Smith him-

self appeared before the convention tonight to assure it of his whole-hearted support for the ticket, but among those who had led the fight for McAdoo the result was taken much to heart.

Mr. McAdoo himself, after the convention, sent from his hotel to Mr. Davis a telegram saying merely: "Please accept congratulations on your nomination."

His principal floor leaders disappeared completely from the convention hall as the balloting approached its final stage, and the central group of McAdoo crusaders among the delegates sat glum and with drawn faces while the convention was making its final choice.

William Jennings Bryan, who had worked among the delegates to prevent a swing to Davis, also expressed openly his disappointment, but issued a statement later saying tersely that he would "support the ticket." The move to place his brother in nomination for the vice presidency later appeared to greatly revive his spirits, and he told friends that the prospect of having a Westerner of the Bryan type on the ticket had led him to the conviction that a real campaign for progressive principles was in prospect. As the balloting for the vice presidency began he returned to his place in the Florida delegation and sat smiling broadly as state after state once more shouted the family name across the convention hall in response to the roll call. Delegations changing their vote on the first ballot enabled the Nebraska governor to get a two-thirds majority.
