Instructions for Beef Canning.
The only safe, dependable way for canning beef is by the use ordinary boiling will canner, for sufficient heat to thoroughly kill all organisms that are in the meat. If meat is not sanitarily cared for from the time it is killed until after processing, it will easily spoil. Be sure that all utensils, knives and tables are as clean as possible.
The beef should always be killed the night before canning and hung up in the quarters to cool. ing the steak, roast, stew parts ing the steak, roast, stew parts
and the liver, heart, tongue and brains. All parts of the beef should be used. The hams or rounds can be used for roast or steak, the loin for roast or steak. The tougher cuts can be used for hash or ground up for chili or sausage. The head can be used for soup stock. The cut of the meat has a great influence on the tenderness of it after cook-
ing, and meat should always be cut across the grain of the meat fibers-not with it. All bones should be cut from the meat and boiled with the stew meat, then they are taken and used for soap grease. After they have been boiled in the lye, and soaked until the lye is out they can be used as chicken feed-mashed up into one meal
To keep the flavor of home cooking, the meats should be boiled, roasted, fried and well
seasoned before canning. This seasoned before canning. This
is done as for the table except is done as for the table except is is entirely tender, the canning process will do that. The steak should be seared until all of the red is cooked out of the thickest pieces; the roast should be kept in the oven and the stew meat boiled until no red or tinge of As long as red shows the heat has not reached the center sufThe for

quickly and conveniently: One large table or two medium one on which to work. The tables should be near the kitchen, also

cooks. Four pots are necessary, cooks. Four pots are necessary, cooking stew meat and a smal one for frying steak. Arrange the pots so that the smoke from the fire will not get in the meat Ten or twelve large pans, such as dish pans, large stewers and roasting pans are necessary, at least six sharp knives and two ong handle forks.
The work should be arranged so that one canner can be ready ting the meat cut up. The steak is usually ready to process first so one person should begin searing steak as soon as enough is sliced to fill the pot once. On gallon of lard is sufficient to bege crowded in theak should not plenty of room for stirring leave stir constantly to stirring, and sticking. One person should begin packing the meat in the cans as soon as it is cooked, another seal them. Paper gasket lids should be adjusted with the wires furnished with the sealer, painted inside for the gasket they should be sealed tighter To tight the paper gasket seal. first roll as for the other seal but the second roll the other seal, flattens the rim of the one that should be the tight one.
