Address all matter plainly and completely in ink, giving street address or box number whenever 1. possible. Place sender's return card in upper left corner of address side.

Pack articles carefully in strong, durable containers.

Wrap parcels securely, but do not seal them except when bearing a printed label or indorsement reading: "Contents: Merchandise-Fourth-class Mail. Postmaster: This parcel may be opened for postal inspection if necessary," together with name and address of sender, as sealed parcels not so labeled or indorsed in printing are subject to postage at the letter rate.

Parcels may be marked "Do not open until Christmas," this being permitted in order to encourage early mailing.

Insure valuable parcels.

Do not inclose letters in parcels, as doing so would subject entire parcel to letter postage.


Written greetings such as "Merry Christmas," "Happy New Year," "With Best Wishes," and names, numbers or symbols for the purpose of description may be inclosed with fourthclass (parcel post) mail. Books may bear simple dedicatory inscriptions not of a personal nature. Other written additions subject parcels to letter postage. Communications prepaid at the first-class rate may be sent with parcels prepaid at the fourthclass rate by securely attaching the envelopes containing the letters or other written matter to outside of parcels.

Christmas seals or stickers should not be placed on the address side of mail.

As a method of giving the foregoing features widespread publicity, it is suggested that postmasters request department stores and like establishments to embody in their Christmas advertising appropriate text bearing thereon.





COME ON, FOLKS FALL IN LINE

Of all plagues that have afflicted the world none is more deadly than tuberculosis, the "great white plague." Although other plagues, ancient and modern, have swept a country and community for a few weeks, months or years, tuberculosis has seized its victims for over 2500 years. 

In Anchored Huts on an Island. Three hundred miles from the eastern coast of Queensland there is an islet with a coral reef fringing it on three sides. On this small dot of the Pacific, Willis Island, an important wireless experiment is being conducted in the interests of meteorology and shipping. Capt. J. K. Davis, commonwealth director of navigation, is spending five months on this island with a wireless plant and two operators and they will not be relieved until next April. The island is swept by storms and the huts erected on it have been "anchored" with chains, so that they will float if the island is temporarily under water. The cost of this experiment is estimated at about £6,000.


Mr. Kahn pointed out that with the development of a company of this nature, he would not confine his market to Texas but would ship his product to all parts of the country, particularly to the Atlantic seacoast. In this event, he asserted, Houston would become the strategic shipping point for the fuel, which he believes will revolutionize the coal industry.

"To ship this product by rail would be prohibitive in cost, but in Houston we have a natural water outlet, which we intend to make extensive use of," Mr. Kahn said.

The company which will control Dr. Raffloer's process will be financed in New York for the most part, with the exception of such Texas capital as may be offered.
