TEXAS LIGNTE DEAL PLANNED

German Engineer and Financier Here to Study Sit-

Houston, Texas, November 25 -The possibility of exploitation on a large scale of the enormous lignite deposits in Texas is seen in the visit to Houston of W. B. Kahn of New York.

Housto would become the strategic shin ping point for the fuel, which he believes will revolutionize the coal industry.
"To ship this product by rail would be prohibitive in cost, but in Houston we have a natura water outlet, which we intend to make extensive use of," Mr. Kahn said.
