river is reached without a bump of your car. For two miles before reaching the ferry at the Murray is passed through, with gins and electric pumping plants. This farm extends up and down the river valley for perhaps 15
miles, and is not only levied against overflow, but is ditched to give adequate drainage. Our information may not be accurate but it is to the effect that the
farm contains about 15,000 acres. It is also said that about 2000 people live on this farm and that they will produce this year anywhere from
bales of cotton.
At the west side of the farm where the San Antonio road crosses the Trinity river, is historic Clapp's Ferry, originally started and owned by Elisha M. Clapp, the noted Indian fighter and pioneer of another day. Mail and stage travel from Nacog doches to Austin and San An tonio once crossed at this ferry.
The old ranch house of Mr. John The old ranch house of Mr. John
McIver of Madisonville about 25 McIver of Madisonvile about
years ago stood a mile and a half east of the ferry. Mr. McIver's ranch was stocked with wild cattle and horses. This wild, ranch land is now being cultivated by Mr. Murray, who began farming operations in a small way further down the river. Mr. Murray's lảnd is rich and black and very
productive. It was largely river productive. It was largely river
valley prairie originally, but valley prairie originally, but
much timber has been cleared from it in recent years. It is one of the wonder farms of Texas and is sufficiently inter esting
time.
TRINTY RIVER FARM CHANGES OWNERSHIP

The Big-4 farm on Trinity river was sold Monday by Smith Bros. to G. L. Murray \& Sons This farm contains about 4,000 acres of cultivated land and will increase the Murray holdings to owned and operated by Mr. Mur ray is protected by levees recently constructed at an enormous cost.
The farm was sold with all teams, farming implements and other property. The price was not divulged, but the considera-
tion was probably in excess half a million dollars. The land will produce millions of dollars worth of cotton in the future. The Murray farms have the own gin, a çacrete structure being under way at the present time. This gin is to be operated by electricity, a large dynamo
having been put in operation re having been put in operation recently for operating pumps used in levee operation and for the
draining of lakes on the farms, draining of lakes on the farms,
and for lighting and other purand for

LEGISLATURE PASSES ANTL-MASKING BILIS

Disguising in Public Dealt Blow by Both Houses at

Austin.
Austin, Texas.-The Legisla ture dealt a decisive blow to masking in public when both houses passed anti-masking.
measures, making it a felony to appear in a church, commit an assault or to go near a private home while disguised.
The Mankin House measure and the Holbrook Senate bill, providing identical penalties, ere passed by large majorities. They differ only in that the Holbeok measure does not exempt he it it any hower mpt social gatherings in private empt soc
homes.
Both measures provide a penalty for prison sentences of five years or more for assault while masked. Appearance at any public place masked or disguisaa oo as to make identity difficult carries a fine of $\$ 500$ or confinement in jail one year, or both. Appearance near or an attempt masker a private home while masked is punishable by imprisonment for a term of from one to ten years. Entry into a e punishable by imprisonment f from two to mprisonment ainments conducted by churches are exempted from this proviion. Parades by any secret society by masked members are given a fine of from $\$ 100$ to $\$ 500$ r a jail sentence of six months or both.
The Holbrook measure was an amendment to the original bill which Senator Holbrook himself offered. It incorporates all the kin bill as it emerged from the House. It excludes the amendment to the House bill, however, organization. Authors of the House bill are agreed, they declared, to this change by the Senate, believing that the exempting of any organization would impair the validity of the act. One bill probably will be substituted for the other to cover all phases of the antimasking question demanded by The vocratic platform. 34 to 22. The Senate passed the Holbrook bill 26 to 1.
