At the west side of the farm, where the San Antonio road crosses the Trinity river, is historic Clapp's Ferry, originally started and owned by Elisha M. Clapp, the noted Indian fighter and pioneer of another day. Mail and stage travel from Nacogdoches to Austin and San Antonio once crossed at this ferry. The old ranch house of Mr. John McIver of Madisonville about 25 years ago stood a mile and a half east of the ferry. Mr. McIver's ranch was stocked with wild cat- Rt. 3. tle and horses. The free city delivery of mails for Crockett is one of the early possibilities, according to Postmaster Cutler. The Crockett postmaster has supplied the postoffice department at Washington with all necessary information and made application for free mail delivery. The department has since notified Postmaster Cutler of the receipt of the necessary details and advised that consideration was being given the application. The department also advised that it will be necessary to refer the matter to a postoffice inspector, who will be sent for an inspection and report. The application is expected to be acted upon as early as possible after the inspector's report is received.

A letter from Congressman Briggs to J. C. Millar of Crockett assures Mr. Millar that the congressman is glad to aid in any way to secure the establishment of city delivery mail service in Crockett at the earliest possible moment. Congressman Briggs also assures Mr. Millar of his continued desire and endeavor to have a federal building established in Crockett at the earliest possible date, as well.

ANTI-MASKING BILLS

but you can buy on adult seas in Disguising in Public Dealt Blow by Both Houses at Austin.

> Austin, Texas.-The Legislature dealt a decisive blow to masking in public when both houses passed anti-masking. measures, making it a felony to appear in a church, commit an assault or to go near a private home while disguised.

> The Mankin House measure and the Holbrook Senate bill, providing identical penalties, were passed by large majorities. They differ only in that the Holbrook measure does not exempt the Shrine or any other organization. It does, however, exempt social gatherings in private

> homes. Both measures provide a penalty for prison sentences of five years or more for assault while masked. Appearance at any public place masked or disguisea so as to make identity difficult carries a fine of \$500 or confinement in jail one year, or both. Appearance near or an attempt to enter a private home while masked is punishable by imprisonment for a term of from one to ten years. Entry into a church by masked persons would be punishable by imprisonment of from two to ten years. Entertainments conducted by churches are exempted from this provision. Parades by any secret society by masked members are given a fine of from \$100 to \$500 or a jail sentence of six months or both.

> The Holbrook measure was an amendment to the original bill which Senator Holbrook himself offered. It incorporates all the essential provisions of the Mankin bill as it emerged from the House. It excludes the amendment to the House bill, however, which wold exempt the Shrine organization. Authors of the House bill are agreed, they declared, to this change by the Senate, believing that the exempting of any organization would impair the validity of the act. One bill probably will be substituted for the other to masking question demanded by the Democratic platform.

PALESTINE MAN ADMITS MURDER

CONFESSES AT ATHENS TO KILLING HIS WIFE WHILE SHE SLEPT.

Palestine, Texas, March 5.-W. A. Anderson on being arrested by Sheriff Goodwin Rogers Wednesday night on a charge of murdering his wife, Mrs. Dessie Anderson, who was found at their home about 2:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon with her throat cut, confessed to officers that he committed the crime himself.

According to Anderson's statement, made first to the sheriff and his deputies and later signed before County Attorney J. N. Davis and District Attorney W. D. Justice at Athens, he and his wife had discussed some domes-tic troubles before retiring on Tuesday night. 

Anderson was notified of his wife's death in Longview and returned to Palestine at once in a service car. On his arrival here he was placed under arrest. He stoutly denied knowledge of the crime first, but agreed to make a statement if taken to an adjoining county.

In charge of Sheriff Rogers, County Attorney Davis, Assistant County Attorney Irving and deputy sheriffs, he was taken to Athens, where a complete confession was made and signed.

The murder created much excitiement and was the topic of animated discussion during the day. Mrs. Anderson was an active worker in the local Catholic church and Anderson has borne an excellent reputation. A son, Bernard Anderson, aged 21, is employed in Houston.

Back to the Whisker Era.

The bishop pleaded for a voice of authority and intelligence in the pulpit. Every pastor should be well versed in theology and preach it, he declared.





SEEMS THAT AUSTIN LOBBYING HAS BEEN UNUSUALLY INTENSE

Austin, Tex., May 8 .- The most "pernicious lobby in the history of the Texas legislature" has been at work this session, according to Senator W. H. Bledsoe of Lubbock.

Not since the days of Governor Campbell, who sent a message to the legislature denouncing the lobby of that day, have the MUST ALWAYS lobbyists been so numerous or so persistent, the senator said. Much of the fatigue and strain BE RIGHT of the intensive legislative session is due to this cause, he declared.

"The only defense a member has is when the senate and house are actually in session," he said. "While we are in our seats we have some rest, but the minute we adjourn for the day or recess at noon the pulling and tugging begins. A hundred times a day we are tackled by some lobbyists. Some of them give information which we are glad to have, which helps us in our work, but many do not. And they have grown so bold that they no longer ask a member to do something; they now tell him what to do.

"The large size of the lobby this year is due greatly to the wish of the oil companies to keep down taxes and to fight off the proposed gasoline tax measure."

JOHN D. IS FLAYED IN BAPTIST SERMON

Trend of Church Lamented by Dr. John Roach Straton of New York.

New York, March 8.—Commenting upon the recent indorsement of the ministry of Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, in a Presbyterian pulpit, by forty members of the Baptist ministers' conference, including Dr. Woelfkin, pastor of the church, attended by John D. Rockefeller Jr., Rev. Dr. John Roach Straton, in a "current topic talk" to his congregation at the Calvary Baptist Church tonight, asked if such action did not mean that the Baptist brotherhood was "really driving fast upon the rocks.

Dr. Straton declared that "Mr. Rockefeller has recently tightened his grip on our denomination here in the Northland by paying the debts of our women's missionary societies and making other large gifts to our missionary work.'

Dr. Straton suggested that the time had come for "a change in crew for our Baptist ship, carrying with it a complete rightabout of direction, if we are to be saved."

He lamented "the transformation of churches from great spiritual soul-winning centers into mere literary societies, social clubs and forums." He declared that "indecency and greed on stage and screen" were the "partial fruit of modernism in church, school and state."
