 -Three Aldermen, One New, Elected.The city marshal's race in Tuesday's election was close between Reed, the present traffic officer, and Sexton, at present the city marshal. Sifford, the night watchman, took third place in the race for marshal. city's history, due to the the city's history, due to the inter-
est of voters and also the presest of voters and also the pres-
ence of women voters, was divided among the candidates for city marshal as follows: Reed, 266 ; Sexton, 250 ; Sifford, 33.
Total votes cast in the marshal's. race, 549.
In the race for city secretary the voting was only two votes perhaps not lnowing which one perhaps not knowing which one to vote for. The vote in this 347; Bynum, 200. Total votes cast in this race, 547 .
The next highest vote cast was for N. H. Phillips for city attorney, this vote being 539 . Captain Phillips was without an opponent.

Three aldermen were to be elected and only three names appeared on the ticket. It is said that some voters became confused as to how many to vote for and seratched the ticket candidates were told by voters after the election that the voter regretted to vote against the other candidates, but was compelled to exercise the right of choice even at the cost of marking off two other friends. That will explain the vote for the candidates in the aidermanic race being under the vote cast in the three races. The vote for the men, all of whom were to be elected, was as follows:

President's Program for Reduc duction of Expenses Being Adhered To.

Washington, April 5.-An ather time-honored practice in the federal service, that of ap pointing a new employe ever government department, gone by the board as a result of the administration's demand for economy. No longer will the luged with calls for new be deto take the places of those leav ing the service or transferring to other branches or fer em to other branches or for em-
ployes to care for new work unployes to care for new work un-
dertaken under congressional appropriations.
By absorbing or redistributing the work of clerks who leave the service the various depart ments will effect a gradual re duction in the number of em ployes, as demanded by President Coolidge. It is the president's view that not only should there be real economy in gov economy as would be demanded by private employers-and ficiency among government em ployes equal at least to that which would be demanded of them in private employment, but also that every man taken into the government service repre sents just that much productive capacity withdrawn from industry.
Instructions issued by the president to reduce the payrol have been passed on by his caband bureau chiefs and orders have been issued in several of the departments that requisition for new clerks should be made only after full consideration has been given to the possibility of doing the work with the force aiready employed.
In the past, there has been a more or less well-defined feeling that every position provided for by congress should be kept filled cancy and reduce the the va ment's appropriation

## HOW TO DESTROY THE CUTWORM

For the last week or more I have had inquiries as to how the cutworm may be controlled, and who are doubtless having the same trouble, I am herewith recommending the following bait:

J. H. Marable of Wood County, who has served nine years of a five to ninety-nine-year sentence oly a charge of murder, was granted a conditional pardon. Ivey Wilson, given five years in Bowie county for alleged robbery, was granted a conditional
