

FOR CITY MARSHAL

Hassell and Phillips Re-Elected -Three Aldermen, One New, Elected.

The city marshal's race in Tuesday's election was close between Reed, the present traffic officer, and Sexton, at present the city marshal. Sifford, the night watchman, took third place in the race for marshal. The vote, the largest in the city's history, due to the interest of voters and also the presence of women voters, was divided among the candidates for city marshal as follows: Reed, 266; Sexton, 250; Sifford, 33. Total votes cast in the marshal's

In the race for city secretary the voting was only two votes less spirited, these two voters perhaps not knowing which one to vote for. The vote in this race was as follows: Hassell,

The next highest vote cast was for N. H. Phillips for city attorney, this vote being 539. Captain Phillips was without an

Three aldermen were to be elected and only three names appeared on the ticket. It is said that some voters became confused as to how many to vote for and scratched the ticket down to one name. Some of the candidates were told by voters after the election that the voter regretted to vote against the other candidates, but was compelled to exercise the right of choice even at the cost of marking off two other friends. That will explain the vote for the candidates in the aldermanic race being under the vote cast in the other races. The vote for the three candidates for city aldermen, all of whom were to be elected, was as follows:

H. J. Trube, 526; J. M. Ellis, 523; H. H. Powers, 514.

State Highway No. 19, running north and south through Houston county, will finally be located on the east side of the railroad. This information was given to a committee from Grapeland that met with a committee from Crockett last Thursday. The road at present is on the west side of the railroad, following the Palestine Crockett road, but when the new road is constructed it will be on the east side as above stated, joining the Anderson county road at Salmon. It has always been supposed that the road would be built on the west side, following pretty closely the present designation, but to do so two underpasses Texas. would have to be built between Salmon and Crockett, and it seems the state and federal governments do not wish to assume this extra expense.



LIBERTY WORKER CHARG-ED WITH STATUTORY OFFENSE.

Houston, Tex., April 6.-Marshall Damon, 27, oil field worker from Liberty, was charged with The common school and rural a statutory offense Saturday in connection with his marriage to Clara Kelly, 12, on March 7. Damon and his child-wife came to Houston several days ago.

They were married by the Rev. One song sung amid a storm Thomas I. Beck, the girl's Officer J. W. Mills, who took the

girl into custody. The mother, Mrs. Annie Dells, told Mr. Mills that she did not know it was against the law for a child under 14 to marry and that she herself was married at 15. Damon went to Liberty for a certificate of marriage and also brought the girl's mother back to Houston with him when he learned that the girl had been taken into custody by Mrs. Anne Burley of the probation department.

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DR. COOK LEAVES FOR U. S. PRISON

Convicted Oil Promoter Has 14 Years Yet to Serve

in Pen.

Fort Worth, Texas, April 5.— Dr. Frederick A. Cook said au revoir but not goodby to Fort Worth Sunday afternoon.

"I'll be back some time," the physician-explorer, writer, oil promoter-convict told the friends who gathered to bid him farewell as he boarded the train for Leavenworth prison. "Texas has been the scene of my bitterest trouble, but I like the State, and plan to make it my home when I am a free man again."

His departure for the federal prison, in which he is under sentence of 14 years and nine months for fraudulent use of the mails, marked the end of another installment of Dr. Cook's astounding career, and also terminated his sojourn of more than 16 months in the Tarrant county jail. Through the clemency of Federal District Judge James C. Wilson, this time spent in jail awaiting results in his battle for a new trial, will be applied on Dr. Cook's sentence.

POISON BRAN MASH FOR GRASSHOPPERS

It has been reported that grasshoppers have made their appearance in considerable numbers in parts of the county, and I take this means of warning every one to be prepared to fight them should they appear in dangerous numbers.

Poison bran mash is the most practical remedy for these pests. The formula is as follows:

Wheat bran, 25 pounds. White arsenic or paris green,

Lemons or oranges, 6 pounds. Low grade cane or sorgum molasses, 2 quarts.

Water, 2 gallons. Mix the bran and poison thoroughly while dry. Dilute the molasses with the amount of water as named, squeeze the lemon juice into this diluted molasses, then grind the rind of the lemons with a meat chopper and add this also to the liquid. Then mix the liquid thoroughly with the poison bran mixture. After an even mixture has been obtained, add more water and mix until a mash is obtained, so that when squeezed in the hand it

readily falls apart. Grasshoppers feed in the morning, and as the bait loses its at-




