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AUTOMOBILE WRECK COSTS NEAL PETTY AN EARLY DEATH

A few minutes after midnight -it was the earliest hour Sunday morning-Neal Petty, son of Mr. and Mrs W. R. Petty, living in northwest Crockett, met a sudden and tragic death in an automobile accident. Neal, with one of the Hollingsworth boys, occupied the rear seat of a Dodge touring car when the car measure. was overtaken with disaster and death. Crushed and hurled from the bounding and rebounding car as it rolled over and over, the young man, who had only recently attained his majority, met a death as sudden as was the accident, his skull being crushed and other fatal injuries sustained. The accident was at West Main street and the railroad trestle, where that street goes under the railroad track on the concrete highway leading west from Crockett. The fatal car, driven by Jim Henry Porter, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Porter, was coming toward town when wrecked against the center piers of the viaduct.

Seeing that the highway accident was not serious, the five boys were returning to Crockett at a fast rate of speed over the highway. It was past midnight and they wanted to get back to town and home. As the car passed under the railroad viaduct, the left rear wheel struck the center trestle support. The car bounded to the other side, struck the right side against the opposite supports, rebounded to the left, swung back to the right, rolled over at least three times and landed on its back across the concrete roadway. Broken glass from the wind shield was in three different places as the car rolled over three times. Jim Henry Porter, the driver, was thrown clear of the car and esso did one of the Hollingsworth boys, riding with the driver. Neal Petty, riding on the rear seat, got the brunt of the wreckage and was crushed to death, his body being picked up from the roadside. One of the Hollingsworth boys, either John or Lewis, riding on the seat with Petty, was badly bruised up. Ted Oliver, the fifth boy, had gotten out on the running board when passing his house farther out, but on account of the speed had failed to get off. Cars passing after the accident stopped and rendered assistance. The Dodge touring car was a complete wreck as it lay on its back across the concrete roadway east of the vladuct, with its wheels turned upward. The five were all under twenty-one except Petty, who had gotten in with the others only a few minutes before.

> Third: Because the principal purpose of such a system is to the public schools at Crockett furnish the county attorney with a proper description of the lands involved in the suits to remember of the summer faculty cover delinquent taxes. The other benefits to be derived from such a system are only such as would subserve the convenience of the county attorney.

Fourth: Because it is my opinion that only a relatively small amount of delinquent taxes would be collected as a direct result of such a system. The greater part of delinquent taxes can be collected without the aid of any such system. My experience convinces me that the majority of tax payers whose lands are delinquent for taxes will pay such taxes when suits are filed for same.

GALVESTON COUNTY PRO-JECT HEADS THE LIST WITH \$471,000.

Austin, Tex., July 14.—State aid grants aggregating \$618,500 were announced today by the state highway commission. None of the funds will be available until after Jan. 1, 1926. Galveston, Houston and Ellis counties were awarded aid with the understanding that the counties were to go forward with the projects on county funds and that the commission would divide total costs on a fifty-fifty basis.

Galveston county, with a grant of \$471,000 to build a concrete highway from Galveston to the Harris county line, tops the list. Houston county was granted \$37,500 for grading and drainage on highway No. 19. Ellis county was awarded \$100,000 to
