

Proceedings Started to Remove Madison County Judge and Others.

Madisonville, Oct. 3.-A petition in quo warranto, intended to oust County Judge T. Ferguson and the other four members of the court of county commissioners of Madison county, was filed in district court here Saturday.

Filing of the petition brought to an actual legal status the county-wide upheaval which resulted here several weeks ago when Judge Ferguson and the commissioners executed a contract condemned by the citzens in two public conventions,

A preliminary term to determine whether or not the district judge will remove the judge and commissioners from office pending the final hearing of the case will be heard by District Judge Harper at Groveton next Friday The regular term of district court falls in December.

At the time the contracts were executed mass meetings of the citizens were called on two different occasions and demands for the resignations of the judge and commissioners were made. They refused to resign. Saturday's legal action was taken as a consequence.

The contracts in question called for the preparation of a map, plat and survey of Madison county for the purpose of aiding in tax collections. An initial fee of \$7500 for the contracting firm was included, together with subsequent percentages.






