



At the present time thousands of rural children are forced to trasfer out of their home districts and pay high tuition rates for the privilege of attending high schools of cities and towns, Superintendent Marrs said. "The state or the school district, or both in co-operation," he said, should provide for payment of tuition charged transferred scholastics when they are forced to leave their home districts in order to secure a high school education, and the Fortieth legislature should pass such legislation as may be necessary to make it possible for rural school pupils to secure a high school education at public expense. The parents of children residing in rural school communities, should not have to pay tuition in order to give their children high school

advantages. "It is the duty of the state to provide the funds with which educational opportunities may be equalized. There will be inequality of financial ability between school districts so long as we have the district system of local support of high schools, because of the variability of rates of local taxation, population and per capita wealth, and it will be necessary for the state to provide funds with which to equalize educational opportunities throughout the state."


