County tax dollars being wasted on waste

dumped... a total of 25 "We're not even half correcting the problem this through with precinct 1," Vandiver said. The estimated \$4,000 in manhours needed to complete the project will have to be added to the fuel and equipment expenses required, he added. "We've just got to put a stop to it," Vandiver said, noting that the problem goes beyond just the removal expense. He explained that at one location this past week, someone deposited a large pile of scrap iron in the middle of one county road, requiring a front-end loader to move it. "That's dangerous," the commissioner said, "especially in the middle of the night." Precinct 2 Commissioner C.E. Grant said his crew routinely picks up such waste throughout the year, estimating that about \$3,000 of his budget goes into the effort. Vandiver said he has been looking into the situation, and plans to bring up the possibility of installing cameras in target areas of the county in hopes of recording the license plates of some of the people illegally dumping. He also said he felt such offenders should be "fined

Sales tax collections still climbing

The City of Muleshoe continues to receive good news from the Texas State Comptroller's office, with another increase in its sales tax allocation.

According to the state comptroller's office, this month's allocation represents August's sales tax collections by local merchants, and reported to the comptroller's office in September.

In \$37,045.07, a decrease of collections fell behind slightly more than \$2,000 from last month's allocations, but an increase period, but only noted an of \$10,318.07 from the increase of 17.25 percent.

Kitchens' last appeal denied

A recent "Petition of Discretionary Review" in the case of Larry Brent Kitchens of Bailey County has been denied by the Seventh Court of Appeals in Amarillo, according to information received from District Attorney Johnny Actkinson.

Earlier this year the Amarillo appeals court affirmed Kitchen's October 2005 conviction for the 2003 murder of Vince Simnacher.

In the recent action, Kitchen's petition was denied without a hearing.

Although Kitchens can "file for a rehearing of the Petition of Discretionary Review," Actkinson says such requests are rarely given. "...It is my opinion that the Kitchens appeal has been completed," he said.

A Message from Trauma Services.... National School **Bus Safety** Week is Oct. 19-25, 2007.

Do your part for school bus safety. School buses are one of the safest forms of transportation in the nation. The reality of school bus safety is that more children are hurt outside a bus than inside one. Perhaps the most difficult thing to teach children, especially young children, is not to go back to pick up items they've dropped near the bus or left on the bus. Here's some safety tips from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration:

- Always be on time to the bus stop.
- Wait for the bus to stop completely and the driver tells you it's okay to board the bus.
- When you get on the bus, take your seat quickly and stay seated.
- Talk quietly; let the bus driver concentrate on the road.
- Wait for the bus to stop completely before leaving your seat.
- When you leave the bus, use the handrail. It'll help you avoid a crash if you stumble.
- Walk not run a safe distance from the bus so the driver can see you and know that you are out of danger.
- If you must cross in front of the bus, make sure the driver can see you. Wait for the driver's signal to cross. Look both ways. Cross the street carefully. Do not run.

Parents and other adults must also do their part. Motorists should heed school bus warning lights and stop when the bus stops to take on or let off passengers, if we all do our part it can be safer still to ride to and from school in that yellow bus.
