

HOUSE BILL SUBSTITUTED, VOTE 20 TO 9. Peffer's Amendment is Lost by a Vote of 28 Yeas to 39 Nays-Blair on the Educational

Bill-in a Bad Fix.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 .- In the senate yesterday; when the vote was called on Mr. Peffer's amendment he "Mr. President, we have not rrendered, nor do we intend to. We don't intend to interpose facetion opposition, but at every stage shall nterpose determined resistance and determined opposition." The question was put on the amendment and it was rejected-yeas 28, nays 39. The amendment voted down revived, with some slight exceptions, the coinage of 1837 and provided for the free coinage of silver. Mr. Voorhees then moved that the substitue reported by the finance committee for the house bill be adopted and asked unanimous consent that after its adoption it might be treated as open to amendment as an original bill would be To the latter request there was no objection. 


