

> Architect's Report. WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—The annual report of Jeremiah O'Rourke, Supervising architect of the treasury, for the year ending September 30 last, shows that during the year expenditures for the erection of new federal buildings and sites and for repairs and preservation of finished and occufederal buildings amounted to \$4,126,159. Contract obligations at the end of the year amounted to \$3,-840,768. The balance of the appropriation available is \$9,232,989, of which \$8,899,167 is for sites and the construction of buildings.

Watering Cows in Winter, " The plan I am contemplating using a single V-shaped trough continuous from one end of the stable to the My mangers to front are the usual distance from the stanchions, and the lower edge of the trough sits on the edge of the manger. The cows will have no trouble. in reach ing the water; in fact, will reach clear over the trough. I will use a good quality of pine free from knots, one inch thick. A board eight inches. wide forms one side and nine inches the other, making the trough exactly eight inches on the inside, leaving the trough clean and smooth on the inside and all parts of the same level, so the water keeps at the same

height for all the cows. The water should be let in at one end of the trough and an overflow pipe in the other end. which is adusted so as to keep the pipes to within one half inch of being full-The overflow being at opposite end from inflow makes sure of good circulation in the water. In order to keep trash, dirt, etc., out of the trough, will have one main cover ensisting of a board thirteen inches wide, running the entire length of the trough, and in this cover holes are cut about eight inches wide and ten inches deep, exactly in front of each cow so that she can drink by herself. Those drinking places are to be covered by a small cover which projects three-fourths of an inchalways longer and as much wider, so that those covers project Threefourths of an inch into the mangers farther than the main cover. cows soon learn to raise this light cover, push their nose in and drink. The back end of this lid which is

lifted up by the cow's nose never stands quite straight. 

A HISTORIC GOLD CUP.

The British Museum's Latest Acquise -James L's Gift to a Spaniard.

James L's Gift to a Spanierd.

James L was a monarch always hard up, but exceedingly lavish with other people's "bawbees." Although he has now happily been defunct for over two centuries his generosity with goods not his own has, according to the report of the trustees of the British museum, just cost the country and several patriotic Englishmen the sum of £8,000. While he was king a Spanish ambassador came to England to conclude peace, and among the presents James awarded him was the royal gold cup, an exceedingly valuable vessel, fashioned in France in 1301 by command of the due de Berry, as a gift to his nephew Charles VI.

It is supposed to have come to England in return for money lent to the French king to carry on his wars; at all events it is found in the inventory of the royal chattles of Henry VIs, and remained in the possession of the English court until James generously gave it away.

The Spaniard gave up the cup to a convent where it remained until 1888, when the abbess sold it to Baron Pich-on of Paris, from whom the Messra. Werthelmer purchased it for £8,000. The last named gentlemen agreed to let the British museum have it at cost price, and the late & e Wrtheimer even subscribed £500 to enable them to acquire it. The treasury gave £2,830 and the remainder was made up by private subscription.

Some mistresses try to enforce the principle that breakages must be paid for out of the meid's wages, but, as was recently tested in a police court. this process is not legal and the servant can claim and secure full wages. just, as in the homes of wealthy perons it might be possible for a car of unrequited labor to pay for.

A suggestion which comes from a riter on the subject is to the effe that housekeepers wight find relief in a "breakage fund." That, for instance, a sum of 8% a month be put aside, to be divided among the servants where two or three are ke t, less if only one is employed, from which sum twenty five cents is dedu ted for every article broken by any one of them.
