

COLUMBUS, O., April 24. - The last reports received by President Mc-Bride of the United Mine workers show suspension of work by 8000 men in Alabama, 5000 in Tennessee and Kentucky, 2000 in West Virginia. 5000 in Indiana, 26,000 in Ohio, 25, 000 in Illinois, 1300 in Jowa, 2000 in the Indian Territory, 1300 in Missouri, 50,000 in Pennsylvania, 300 in Michigan; total 125,000.

Duel to the Death. HERMOSILLA, Mex., April 26 .- A sensational double tragedy is reported from the Des Cabezas mining camp, in this state.
