Mules bring home District championship

Falcon Stadium took on a playoff atmosphere Friday night with a standing room only crowd. The stands were packed with an estimated 3000 attendance. Many were forced to stand along the fence to watch the District 2-2A Championship

Many in attendance had no affiliation with either school but came knowing it had been dubbed 'The game of the week in the Panhandle.'

The more experienced Mules took the game to a much higher level than the Bushland varsity, with only two years of varsity competition, had ever experienced. The Mules scored in every quarter to ground the Falcons 42-17.

"We thought we could get it done tonight," said Mule coach David Wood. "But as old coach you always have to be prepared for the worst. "After the kids saw them on film the first time, they said we can get them coach."

"We let them get a little momentum in the second quarter but we were still up at half time and that was good. The only game plan we had coming here tonight was to wear them down."





Remembering goodbye

states, we will continue running her column as she addresses the various issues she encountered while in Iraa.)

I've been home for four days, and already I am off again... to Texas. The alarm wakes me at 4 a.m. today, and I get up to catch my 7 a.m. flight to Dallas. Traffic is dense on the highway, but I make it to the airport just in time to realize that my flight leaves from terminal three.

Terminal three is the very place where I said goodbye to my husband as he left for Iraq some five months ago. Military families are allowed to enter through security to say their goodbyes. It's a kind gesture, but really just delays the inevitable.

Five months ago, I sat in a chair next to my husband, staring at the gate where I would watch him walk

I could not find tears, but my heart beat against my chest, my pulse thrumming in my ears, my stomach sick with fear of what might happen to my husband in Iraq; dreading a year without my love.

I wanted to be strong and brave, to be a supportive wife, so the tears flowed only after the last kiss goodbye. I sobbed as I walked away. I now know that my husband did too. We tried to be strong for each other. We still do.

Today, as I stand in the place where we said goodbye, my stomach turns and I feel like I'll be sick, the emotion of that day filling me again. I make it through security just fine; no tears come. I've learned to keep more than my happiness. those at bay by now, in public anyway.

I'm doing just fine keeping the tears under wraps until I see them: a man in uniform bending forward in his chair under the weight of this heavy day, and a woman, her hand on his head, and then his neck, her head leaned close to his.

She's wearing dark sunglasses and I know exactly why. I remember so well the pain of those last moments, the fear.

I remember the sense

(Editor's Note: Although that my husband and I were Terah has returned to the beginning something that goes against all natural instinct, but that joins me with millions of women in history who have sent their lovers to war. I somehow found strength in this, and

> still do. I wait until the uniformed man boards the flight, and then catch the woman as she walks away. Nothing I say will take away her heartache.

My throat feels like I swallowed a golf ball as I say to the woman that I've been where she is.

That first day is the hardest. It gets less painful, but it never gets easy.

Having just been in Iraq, I believe with all of me that we cannot leave there. But I ache with the pain that us being there causes for people who never asked

And though I hope and believe that the sacrifices being made will birth at least some semblance of peace and freedom for families in Iraq, I can't help but hate the very fact of war and what it does to our families.

There is a selfish part of me that says we should end it now. Bring our men home. Bring my husband home to me. We take care of our own. Let them sort it out. This is their problem. Not mine... not ours.

Part of me wants more than anything for this to end no matter what the cost to the Iraqi people.

But there is another part of me that believes that good must fight against evil, that strong must protect weak, and that our honor is worth

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Editorial

Is service in Iraq necessary?

"It's one thing if someone believes in what's going on over there and volunteers, but its another thing to send someone over there in a forced assignment."

With such words in a recent Associated Press story, Mr. Jack Croddy, who was described in the story as a senior foreign service officer, expressed his opinion that it is apparently alright for the members of the armed services to be held to their oaths, but to do so to other branches of the government, especially his own, is somehow unfair.

Yes, Mr. Croddy, it is dangerous in Iraq, just ask the families of the men and women who have upheld their oaths and paid the ultimate price in the process.

Or ask the families of the journalists and other civilians who have died over there as well. They might not have taken oaths to their country, but in many cases they had personal beliefs that while not legally binding were just as strong.

But, Mr. Croddy, you might take some comfort in the knowledge that not one of the flag-drapped coffins that have returned from service in Iraq have reportedly contained the honored remains of a U.S. Foreign Service officer.

Mr. Croddy, you are concerned about your children should you be lost in the line of "reluctant" duty, but a large number of our military have no doubt experienced similar concerns, and left their families behind to travel into "harm's way." Many of them did this with the hope that their service in Iraq would diminish the danger for their children... and vours... here in the states.

But what is especially frightening is your attitude. No, not your attitude or concerns about being shot or worse, but rather your apparent attitude that your service isn't needed in Iraq.

At such a troublesome time, the services of both peacekeepers and peacemakers are desperately needed.

Both the officials engaged in the peace process, and the foreign service members who support them are as vital to the future security of this nation as the commanding general, infantryman and supply truck driver serving abroad.

Can victory in Iraq come from force of arms alone? We don't think so. It's not about conquest. It's about solving an international problem. We can't think of any victory, including that of World War II, that resulted from military might alone. Without peace, there is no victory.

...And that, Mr. Croddy, is why you are needed in Iraq.

May we never grow so "holy," may we never be so "mature," may we never become so "religious" that we can see the footprints of Satan and stay calm.

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
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

don't remember how old I was; I just remember that I was hungry. I was a boy. I was alive. So I was hungry. It was early—early, at least, for a Sunday morning.

My mother had been doing some cooking, probably for a church dinner, when I happened through the kitchen. On a platter, brown and beautiful. having just come out of the oven (I thought), were some meatballs. They looked great! So I did what any growing



boy would do. I snitched one. Downed it. Pretty much in one bite.

What I didn't know until Mom missed the meatball, and what I hadn't known because I knew more about meatball-eating than meat-ball cooking, was that Mom had just browned the outsides of those meatballs, and they weren't done yet.

Not even close.

The inside of that meatball was completely raw. And though the Surgeon General and other health honchos may change positions once a week or so on whether this or that or the other is good for you, I expect no one will ever say that eating raw hamburger meat is a very healthy thing.

Yes, the outside looked great, but the inside was raw.

What's bad in "not yet done" meatballs is much worse if it's found in the lives of men and women who claim to live for God. God's children are called to live "transparent" and beautiful lives. What you see (on the outside) is supposed to be what you get (because it's genuine from the inside out).

The pastor who preaches God's grace on Sunday is to live in such a way that he exudes it on Monday.

The elder who prays beautifully on Sunday is to live beautifully on Tuesday.

The deacon who opens the door for a widow on Sunday is to live an open life on Wednesday.

The Sunday School teacher who leads little children on Sunday is to live a winsome life on Thursday that helps lead her coworkers toward the Lord and not away from him.

And you probably get the point about Friday and Saturday, too.

God's people are pardoned by the blood of his Son and empowered by his Spirit every day, not just on Sundays. What people see on the outside is to be an absolutely true and authentic expression of what is on the inside. By Christ's power, God's people are to have the kind of beauty that counts, through and through.

Jesus used word pictures to portray this truth. If we're not the "genuine article" inside and out, Jesus says that our lives are like "whitewashed tombs," painted pretty as a picture on the outside but full of decay and putrefaction inside. Or we're like bowls and plates that look spotless and clean on the outside but have the remains of last week's supper molding on the inside. And that's just wrong.

Harris acquired a nursing license in 1952 and worked as a nurse until 1963 when the couple moved to Albuquerque, N.M.



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

Sound policies support Texas agriculture

By Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison

America's heritage is as a nation of farmers, and agriculture remains essential to our prosperity. In Texas, we know this first hand. Our state leads the country in many areas of production, and agricultural revenue bolsters our economy by more than \$19 billion annually. Approximately 80 percent of our land is involved in some kind of agricultural production, and more than 90 percent of those operations are run by families. As your U.S. Senator, I have worked hard to ensure that federal legislation meets the needs of our farmers and ranchers. In the coming weeks the Senate will consider reauthorization of many vital agricultural programs, and I will work with my colleagues to maintain the policies that have been good for Texas.

The Farm Bill that I supported in 2002 provided a crucial safety net for our Texas producers and carefully balanced support for commodities, conservation and nutrition. At the time the bill was passed, commodity prices were low, which cut deeply into farm profits and

discouraged investment in "Farming looks mighty easy agriculture. Family farms position. In addition, exports of American agricultural goods to overseas markets had declined for five consecutive years. Largely as a result of the policies in the 2002 Farm Bill, commodity prices have risen and exports have grown each of the last five years. In fact, exports have now reached record highs. more than \$68.6 billion in 2006 and an expected \$79 billion this year. These gains are immensely beneficial to our international trading position and our domestic economy.

Many key provisions of the 2002 Farm Bill expire this year, and must be renewed. As we debate the new bill, I will strive to preserve the positive aspects of existing policy. However, there are some who would prefer to strip our farmers and ranchers of crucial support and have introduced measures to reduce current payment levels. Our farmers and ranchers face distinct challenges, and failing to assist them could have dangerous consequences.

As President Dwight D. Eisenhower once said,

when your plow is a pencil without large capital reserves and you're a thousand miles were in an especially difficult from the cornfield." Farmers and ranchers often assume large amounts of debt to be able to grow the food and fiber products we use each day. Yet the average farmer receives only nineteen cents for each dollar we spend on food, at home or dining out. And Texas farms and ranches are generally larger than those in others states, with higher input costs and capital outlay requirements. Without a strong federal safety net, many farmers simply could not afford to produce. The programs I have supported in the U.S. Senate have helped make agriculture economically viable and have spurred new investment in this vital sector.

> Farmers and ranchers are not the only ones who depend on reliable production. Without proper planning and support for our producers, food shortages in times of disaster like the 2005-2006 droughts could become a real danger. A lack of farm goods means much more than empty shelves or high prices at the store. Reliance on foreign agriculture could jeopardize our economy and the safety of our national food supply. Texas is the nation's biggest

cattle producer and a leading supplier of wheat, rice and citrus. We grew more than 33 million bushels of wheat in 2006—enough to make 2.45 billion loaves of bread! Our leaders have a responsibility to ensure the flow of these foods to America's dinner

These issues were brought into sharp focus last year, when Texas endured more declared disasters than any other state, including the most devastating wildfire in our history. I am pleased that the current draft of the new Farm Bill establishes a \$5.1 billion emergency fund to assist our farmers and ranchers in the wake of major disasters. After future catastrophic events, the U.S. Department of Agriculture would be able to draw immediately from this fund to help our producers recover, rather than wait for Congress to approve additional funding requests. In the past, emergency requests have been laden with earmarks and unrelated spending, because lawmakers know such bills will pass with very little opposition. Producers who suffer production losses would be eligible for benefits such as 75 percent of the value of lost livestock.


