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Choked to Death.

The Terrell Times-Star says: - A patient confined in the first male ward at the Terrell asylum met a horrible death Tuesday morning about six o'clock. Justice Cariker held an inquest and from him and others we learn the details of the killing. The dead man's name was Dillon-Dick Dillon. That is, he came to the asylum from Lamar county under that name. That was an alias, though, we are told, and he once lived in Terrell. Dillon was a man of about 145 pounds in weight and was about 45 years old. Nath Arnold, the man who killed

Arnold claims that Dillon knocked getting on top of him and choked ate patient, and his story of Dillon knocking him down hardly looks reasonable. Anyhow, he killed Dillon by choking, and that, too, inside the walls of the building, in the day time, when such an occurrence should have been impossible



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
