The Story is One of Love, Poverty and the Seeking of Death to Overcome Trouble. The Girl's Father Objected to Their

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 1 .- The mystery of the National hotel tragedy has been cleared up when relatives came here to take care of the young girl in her dying moments and to take away the dead body of the man with whom she sought to die. The girl is still alive. but has not regained consciousness, and can not live.

The story revealed is one of love. poverty and the seeking of death to overcome troubles that were by no means serious. John Hartigan, the dead man, was but 21 years old, the son of a farmer; who lives at Connor Station. Mary Bush, barely 19 years old and quite pretty, is the daughter of a poor section hand, who works on the Missouri Pacific railroad at Pomeroy.

The country wouth and maiden had met and loved, but when they proposed marriage, the girl's father obected. Young Hartigan was without means. From developments it is evident that the young lovers discussed their poverty, the parental objection to thet marriage and what seemed to them their dark prospects, until death seemed preferable to life.

Their journey to this city Friday night and the tragedy, which undoubt edly will result in the death of both, was the result.

Spanish Government in Fear.

New York, Sept. 1 .- A dispatch from Havana savs:

The dispairing dispatch explained that the Spanish government has taken alarm at the developments of a recent interview between United States Minister Taylor and the Duke of Tetuan, Spain's minister of foreign affairs.

A firm of druggists began to manufacture the serum and employed the dector's laboratory assistant to direct the process; the doctor found this out, but did not dismiss the assistant, and has had to resign his place.

Disagreeably projecting ears have been successfully manipulated and im-proved by surgical skill. A crescentshaped piece of cartilage is taken from the back of the ear, the cut sewed and a bandage applied until the wound is healed, when a properly formed ear is the result.
