



Right Way to Warm Buildings. There is ample evidence to prove that the rational heating of buildings was a well-understood art several thousand years ago. In the palmy days of Pompeii's early existence, before its burial nder volcanic ashes, the old Roman boths were heated by steam, and in a better and far more scientific manner than is followed at the present time. The walls of the buildings were double, and the steam, at atmospheric pressure, no doubt, was carried up through these walls, all around the rooms to be warmed, bringing them to a temperature approximating that of the steam, and the occupants of the rooms were from all directions.
